#### Don't Forget Birds This Winter

Winter feeding stations for song birds now being started by bird lovers may prove harmful unless they are maintained throughout the winter and until birds are able to find natural food in the spring, according to the conservation department's game

When feeding stations are abandoned during the winter, after birds have been lured from their regular living places in the wild, the birds often suffer from lack of food, especially during inclement weather. Feeding is especially important after ice storms, when birds cannot reach weather seldom kills birds that have

an adequate food supply. Persons planning to operate feeding stations this winter should start now, the conservation department advises. Sunflower seeds, cracked nuts, acorns, parts of coconuts, wheat, corn millet and a variety of other seeds may be used for feed. Pieces of suet fastened firmly in trees, and running either shelled or in the ear is satisfactory food for game birds,


