The Stable and The Inn W. HAROLD PAILTHORP

The one fact in the Christmas Story that is known so well, and also deplored so much, is that Jesus was born in a stable, because in that ancient inn there was no room for the mother, Mary, and the father, Joseph. Whenever the tale of Jesus' birth is told, the manger scene and the cattle stall of the drama play a prominent part as a unique and humble backdrop for

divinity touching our humanity. It comes about that our children learn about our Lord's manger cradie almost before they are out of their own cradies. And a strange beauty and wonder now has come to enhance and to exalt the lowly stable, the cattle stall, the Baby's bed of straw; so that little children find in the setting of

stall, the Baby's bed of straw; so that little children and in the setting of these poor Galilean peasants a peculiar fascination. The reason for the parents of Jesus being on a journey when their first babe was born, is quite well known, since Caesar Augustus had decreed that all the world must pay a poll tax. So it was necessary that Joseph and Mary leave their home town of Nazareth in Galilee to make a journey to Beth-lehem to conform with Roman decree, (In that day the wars of the Romans demanded oppressive taxes). While it was not a long distance from Nazareth to Bathlehem as we think of distance today, not over eighty-five demanded oppressive taxes). While it was not a long distance from Nazareth to Bethlehem as we think of distance today, not over eighty-five miles at the most, just a two hour drive, but it was a long trek for Joseph and Mary. Mary probably rode on the back of a donkey with Joseph walking a bit ahead leading with a short rope tied to the bridle. The road was hot a road as we regard our ribbons of pavement, only a widened path, rough and dangerous. After three days of slow travel they arrived at Bethlehem. Stopping at the first inn in the outskirts of the city they discovered that it was filled up. But they could go no farther for Jesus was to be born. The world has always found something wrong in the fact that they could make no room for Mary and the babe that night. We regret that the one who was to become the saviour of the world had to be born in a stable.

Perhaps the poor people did not think of a barn as a bad place for babies to be born. At least we know that no hospitals existed in that day. It remained for the disciples of this Jesus to create hostels and hospitals for the sick. With us, of course, it is different. After nineteen hundred years and more, we know who Jesus is. We celebrate the birthday of the Babe under eircumstances that Jesus should have enjoyed. We make room for Him with bright colored Christmas trees; our gifts, our cards and big Christmas din-ners. Do you wonder if we do? How could we make room for Him in our world today? Jesus does not come to our homes as a little babe this week. world today? Jesus does not come to our homes as a little babe this week. The Christ does not come on Wednesday eve with a request to stay over night or just for a few days, but to stay all the time in our hearts and lives. He comes whenever we meet with fellow humans hungry, thirsty and naked. We meet Jesus in the prison as we visit the prisoners. Jesus identified Himself with all men, especially the sore distressed, the oppressed, the duwntrodden. The way we make room for the least of these, the most forsaken humans, we make room for Jesus today. Jesus breaks into our lives by the generosity and kindness shown to the starving peoples of the earth, the prisoners of war and the troubled and sorrowing.
