#### Registration for Selective Service

Monday, Feb. 16, Is Day Appointed; Hours Are 7:00 a. m. to 9:00 p. m.

Only nine simple questions will be asked those men who register next Monday, February 16, for possible military service under the provisions of the Selective Service Act, Col. E. M. Rosecrans, state director of Selective Service for Michigan, emphasized today.

Registration of the individual should require a comparatively short time, the director said. The registrant will not be asked to fill out question- Royal Neighbors naires but must only answer questions about his identity, his place of residence, and his mailing address. Also he will be required to list his telephone, if any; his age in years and date of birth, place of birth, the name and address of the person who will always know his address, his employer's name and address, and his place of employment or business.

While it is important that registration be conducted as speedily as possible, Col. Rosecrans said that every registrant will be given ample time to respond properly to the questions on the registration card, which on this occasion will be green. White and melon colored cards, respective- High School Has ly, were used for the first and second Selective Service registrations.

No questionnaires will be given registrants when they register February 16, nor will they then be required to undergo any physical examination. Questionnaires are given to registrants after their order numbers have been determined and reached by their local boards. Physical examinations are given only after the boards have passed on the general qualifications of registrants and have deterred for reasons of interest to the Na-

While registration must be conducted as of February 16 to conform to the President's Proclamation issued early in January, all persons who will find it impossible to register on that day may register at the office of their local board on Saturday or Sunday preceding Registration Day.

When registered, each registrant must answer the following nine questions: (1) Name of Registrant; (2) Place of Residence; (3) Mailing Address (if other than Place of Residence); (4) Telephone; (5) Age in Years and Date of Birth; (6) Place of Birth; (7) Name and Address of Person who will always know your Oakland County will hold a box social Address; (8) Employer's Name and and dance on Saturday evening, Feb-Address, and (9) Place of Employ ment or Business.

After a registrant has answered all questions and signed his name to the registration certificate signed by the of \$40.00 towards the purchasing of registration card, he will be given a registrar. This certificate must be in the personal possession of the registrant at all times. #### Save Waste Material For Home Defense

A renewed plea for waste material was voiced this week by officials of the Oakland County Defense council as they pressed their "Salvage for Victory" campaign into every nook

and cranny of the county. Stressing the importance of their campaign, they urged farmers to assemble scrap iron that they may have accumulated from worn parts of machinery, and they called on housewives to collect waste paper, magazines, rags and metals for which they

have no further use. Chairman O. L. Beaudette of the salvage committee, pointing out that the cooperation of every man, woman and child in the nation is necessary if America is successfully to prosecute the war, declared:

"Small bits of metal which one might think too insignificant to be of value might go toward making one bullet that will bring us just that much closer to victory.





## Crates to Replace **Potato Sacks**

Shortage of Burlap Will Make This Necessary

Saws and hammers in the hands of Michigan's farmers can solve some Michigan's farmers can solve of the problems resulting from a sharp reduction in available burlap for bagging up the prospective 1942 crop of potatoes.

Right now potato growers can make crates that will serve during make crates that will serve during make crates that will serve offered by

the war years. Details are offered by W. Ira Bull, extension forester at Michigan State College. Proof that the crates are adequate for the job and can be made to give years of service has been found right on the college experiment station at Lake City.

Oak crates made for potato pick-Oak crates made for potato picking and hauling are still in service

after 13 years of hard service. Any species of wood is suitable for box and crate stock, according to members of the college forestry staff. In tests made in the U.S. Forest Products laboratory at Madison, Wis .. the poorest species when properly constructed and nailed proved superior to the best species put together

with improper nailing. One caution is suggested. If aspen or pine is used for crate stock, the cleats should be of some harder species such as oak, hard maple or birch. When thin box nails or staples are clinched, the container gains added strength.

A standard one bushel crate should have a capacity of 2,160 cubic inches to satisfy potato crate specifications for rail shipments. Inside dimensions are 12 by 12 by 15 inches, to hold approximately 52 pounds.

Nailing directions and suggestions for cutting stock for bottoms, sides and end panels can be obtained from county agricultural agents or from the forestry extension service at Michigan State College.

#### Pigs Will Be Pigs During the War

Pointers on How to Feed To Best Advantage

Pigs for pork assume some of the importance that "pigs" for steel rate in the struggle for dominance in the present war emergency. Which leads to a recommendation that Michigan farmers feed some of their brightest and highest quality alfalfa hay to prospective sow mothers.

Home-grown alfalfa hay of excellent quality makes an ideal supplement to grain for sows between breeding and farrowing time, says V. A. Freeman of the animal husbandry staff at Michigan State Col-

Experiments at the college indicate that from one-fourth to one-third of the sow's ration can be alfalfa. With corn or coin and outs the hay lowers the cost of wintering sows and permits the use of home-grown feed.

Normally the sows will pick out enough hay from a rack where fresh supplies are placed every two or three days. But if hay is high priced it may pay to grind the hay.
