The increasing importance of old newspapers, magazines, books, cigaret cartons, cardboard boxes, envelopes, letters and all other waste paper that the Salvage Committee of the Oakland County Defense Council asks people to save is shown by these facts:

Just one newspaper can make three 26 pounded shell cups, and the average-sized popular magazine the nterior components of two mines. Other bits of paper would make other military material as follows:

Six old books would make one mortar shell carrier. One soap powder cannister would

make four aero engine caskets. Sixty large cigarette cartons would nake one outer shell container.

Five medlum size cartons would make one shell fuse assembly. Twenty breakfast cereal cartons members. would make one case for three

ounded shells. Six old bills would make one washer for a shell. Four assorted food cartons would

WARTIME CAMERA **CENSORSHIP**

The wartime tourist who takes a camera with him outside the United States will be affected by Office of Censorship regulations about exporting and importing films and photo-

These amateur photographers will not be able to carry along any unexposed films except to Canada. Instead they can purchase their films on the other side of the border or on shipboard. Manufacturers, however, can continue to send films to foreign dealers on receipt of a special license.

The returning traveler who wants to bring into the United States undeveloped still or motion picture films will turn them over to Customs officers for development. If facilities point not known to their parents. are not available for development at the point of entry, they will be forwarded to another Customs station. by Miss Betty Ann Bailey at her All developed films and photographic prints in the possession of travelers also will be examined. Unexposed films purchased abroad, however, cannot be brought into this country. Byron Price, Director of Censorship, explained that there was no desire to work undue hardships on vacationing camera fans, but that for the sake of complete protection, it was necessary to apply the same regulations to them, as to commercial photographers. He expressed the hope that amateurs would cooperate as wholeheartedly in this program as they are doing in efforts to prevent the unauthorized photographing military, naval, and war production subjects within the United
