Well, just such an incident occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hawley Skarritt in Clarkston on Sunday night when at 8:15 the telephone operator said, "Hello San Francisco" and the next voice was that of the operator in Hawaii.

Arrangements had been made by Kenneth sometime in advance of Father's Day and 8:15 Sunday night was the appointed time. The telephone company installed an amplifier in the living-room so that everyone present could hear both sides of the conversation. A telephone company representative was present to see that everything worked right. There was a certain tenseness in the room until the telephone rang and everything was in readiness. Mr. and Mrs. Judd Skarritt and Hawley were allowed to talk and you may rest assured that they as well as Kenneth were really thrilled. For an instant you could tell that all parties were having trouble with that nasty lump in the throat but everyone soon gained composure and the conversation went on as planned. Kenneth said he was well and he hoped the war would soon be over so that he could join his folks and friends in Clarkston. He congratulated his father and then told them that mail was always welcomed and he hoped everyone would write. He also informed them that he had been made a corporal.

There were a few tears shed but as they were tears of joy no one was harmed. The group got busy just as soon as the conversation was ended and each wrote a note to Kenneth. A nice big bulky envelope was on its way, air mail, to Hawaii on Sunday night.

Many more in Clarkston would like to have heard Kenneth's voice as he has been away from the home town for quite some time and has had some exciting experiences. Everyone wishes him well and hopes that before long all of the boys will be enjoying the peace and comfort of their homes.

Country Needs More Rubber

Rubber Campaign Is Being Successful

Have you searched your attic, your cellar, your garage and your cupboards for scrap rubber? There is still time to take it to any gas station.

On Monday of this week Ralph Habermas of Clarkston carried on a campaign for scrap rubber. He, with the consent of the Scoutmaster, organized the Clarkston Boy Scouts, and they made a house to house canvass in the town and for about three miles out of town in every direction. The response was good considering that the housewives had not had time to search thoroughly. However according to the last report which was not the final report the boys had collected in one day over 683 lbs. of rubber; over 500 lbs. of metal and 3800 lbs. of paper. Mr. T. S. Boyns, chairman of the Salvage Committee, expects to have a full report next week.

Rubber and metal is the great need of the country now. The citizens responded so well when called upon for scrap paper that the waste paper shortage is over. Until there is a definite assurance of an outlet for paper collected it would be wise for citizens to discontinue their efforts in this direction and concentrate on collecting scrap rubber and metal.

Retailers to Sell War Stamps and Bonds

Garald O'Dell Appointed Chairman for Independence Township

"Take part of your change in Defense Stamps."

This is the slogan which will greet the eyes of millions of customers in the Nation's retail stores at every cash register in the United States.

"Take part of your change in Defense Stamps" will be inscribed on stickers upon or adjacent to every cash register as the result of a cooperative effort on the part of the Treasury Retail Advisory Committee, the retail outlets, and the National Cash Register Company.

Secretary Morgenthau declared recently that this new campaign in behalf of the Defense Savings program will be of outstanding service to the Treasury Department.

"I am very much impressed with the plan for placing Defense Stamp displays on all cash registers in the country," Secretary Morgenthau said. "Your company (N. C. R.) and your field representatives will render both retailers and the Treasury Department an outstanding service by providing and installing these displays at your own expense."

Maj. Benjamin H. Namm, of Brooklyn, chairman of the Retail Advisory Committee, and L. H. Thompson, vice president in charge of sales, for the National Cash Register Company, of Dayton, Ohio, have worked out the details for a Nation-wide participation in this phase of the Defense Savings program.

There are more than 3,000,000 cash registers in approximately 1,750,000 retail outlets in the country. Some 1,600 salesmen and approximately 3,200 service men for the National Cash Register Company in their 200 offices throughout the country will furnish the stickers for the registers, and make a report of the number of selling points in the retail outlets in the Nation.

The merchants of this district have agreed to co-operate with the Chairman and the sale of bonds and stamps should increase in this district.
