Third Blackout Completely Effective

The Independence Township Citizens Defense Corps acting under orders issued by State authorities and working in conjunction with all communities of the lower half of the Lower Peninsula of the State effected a complete blackout of the Township on Wednesday night from 10 to 10:30. Approximately 125 persons were mustered to man the Police, Air Raid Warden, Fire, Medical Aid and Messenger sections. Ambulance service and medical aid were in force. Certain minor fractions of the blackout laws involving failures to extinguish all lighting and to heed the warning of Wardens to take cover for the full period of the blackout were reported. Full co-operation of citizens is the key to success in the Defense Corps' efforts to build an organization whose duty is to protect life and property in an emergency, and barring a very few minor oversights, this third blackout was a complete success.

Final preparations are now being made for the annual Oakland County 4-H Exposition to be held August 19-20 at the 4-H Farm Center located on M-24 just south of Walton Boulevard on the outskirts of Pontiac. Livestock members are busy fitting their animals and training them to pose. Canning Club members are critically judging the foods they have canned thus far this year to select the jars that have the greatest possibilities of winning blue ribbons. Garden Club members are keeping a watchful eye on their produce to spot possible entries in the garden exhibit. Girls in the Food Preparation project are trying recipes and techniques in an effort to find those which will help them make a superior food exhibit.

Miss Marian Moore, Home Demonstration Agent of Genesee County, will judge all the girls' exhibits. Mr. Gordon Morrison of Rochester will judge garden exhibits. Livestock will be judged by M. H. Avery, Assistant State Club Leader. There are over 300 livestock and crop projects and nearly 100 foods projects being carried by 4-H Boys and girls this year. Because of the farm labor shortage and transportation problems, not all the members will exhibit, however.

The leader of the Clarkston Club is Eugene Hubbard. Kenneth See directs the Drayton Plains Club and Harold Wright the Oak Hill Club. The leaders of the Girls' Clubs include Mrs. A. Hutchinson and Mrs. K. See in Drayton Plains and Mrs. Neal Storm in Ortonville.

The Pontiac State Hospital and the Pontiac Daily Press are each awarding a purebred heifer calf to a 4-H Club member, the basis for selection being the members' attitude and interest in club work and facilities at home for rearing the animal.

The Pontiac Daily Press is awarding six dozen wide mouth jars to the canning club scoring the highest rating, and three dozen wide mouth jars to the canning club scoring second. They are also awarding nests of Marianne cups and measuring and mixing spoons for each club member of Food Preparation Clubs scoring similarly.

The Oakland County Holstein Friesian Association is offering special fitting and showing prizes for members having Holstein calves, while the Exposition offers similar awards for the other breeds of dairy cattle.

Thursday is family day. It is hoped many will bring picnic lunches. There is room for all on the spacious grounds around the farm center. Friends of 4-H are also invited to view the accomplishments of these boys and girls of Oakland County.

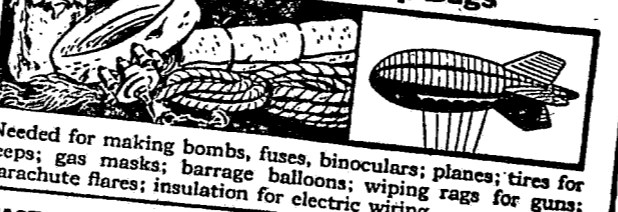

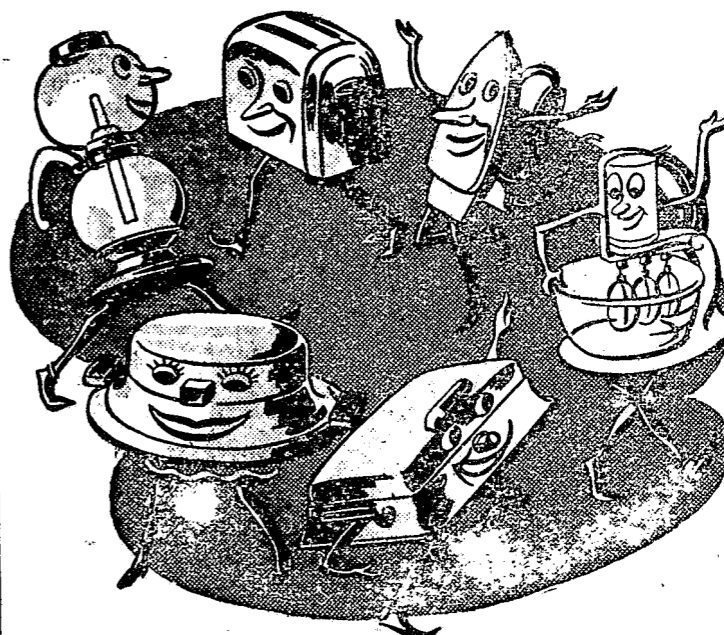

YOUR ELECTRIC IRON—Keep bottom of iron clean. Avoid ironing over zippers, snaps, hooks and eyes. Don't go away to answer the doorbell, telephone, etc. and leave the iron turned on—even for a minute. Keep the cord away from a hot iron. Be sure the iron is cold before putting it away. Be careful not to drop your iron.

YOUR TOASTER—Never dip a toaster in water. Don't jab at it with a fork to remove a piece of toast. Brush off crumbs with a cloth or soft brush. Many toasters have a removable bottom plate for cleaning out collected crumbs.)

YOUR COFFEE MAKER—Keep inside of coffee maker clean. (Never permit left-over coffee to stand in the coffee maker.) Clean and rinse filter cloth thoroughly after using. Keep filter cloth in cold water between usings.

YOUR FOOD MIXER—Always remove beaters or attachments immediately after using. Wash with warm water, rinse and dry. Clean body of mixer with soap and water, being careful not to get water into the motor. Follow manufacturer's directions as to oiling, operation, etc.

YOUR WAFFLE IRON—Wipe off grids with a dry cloth after use. Use a stiff brush to remove any particles that stick. Never wash the grids. Wipe any spilled batter from outside of waffle iron with a damp cloth. Never put the waffle iron in water. The Detroit Edison Company.
