This station would be very necessary in case of an emergency. In case of a bombing the roads to hospitals in nearby towns might be impassable.

fine sieve in order to remove the skins and seeds. Add from 1/2 to 1 teaspoon of salt to each quart of juice. However, omit salt if the juice is for infants or invalids on saltless diets. Reheat the juice immediately. If you use glass containers, heat the juice just to boiling, pour it into the sterilized jars or bottles and seal. No processing is necessary. Invert the jars while they are cooling. Do not leave any head space when putting tomato juice in either glass jars or
