

For Homemakers

Textile mills have heavy schedules to meet in wartime. Every saving on household textiles helps ease the burden on those mills. Michigan State College extension specialists in home economics tells how to get longer wear from sheets and pillowcases.

One suggestion is to distribute the wear as evenly as possible. Sheets wear out most quickly where the sleeper's shoulders rest, so it is wise Mrs. Russell Maybee and daughter, to reverse the sheet once in a while to put the top part at the bottom of the bed. Sheets also last longer if a sheet rests between the times it's used. A good scheme is to put freshly laundered sheets on the bottom of the pile in the linen closet, and use the ones on top first.

Loose or sharp wires on bedsprings or splinters in bed rails can snag or tear sheets. Bend down such wires, sandpaper splintery places and mend tears in sheets before they get

Both sheets and pillowcases that quickly than those the right size. You can piece sheets to make them longer or give them more tucking-in room at the sides. If your pillowcases are narrow, piece them at the sides.

Underslips, the removable coverings for pillows, lighten wear on cases by acting as a "buffer" between the case and the harsher pillow ticking. Using a sheet or pillowcase as a laundry bag is one of the hardest uses to which it can be put.


Insect control should be confined to kill insects and not persons or valuable stock. Employment of sprays or dusts should take note of the perils of the application.

Why can't I HEAT MY HOUSE electrically?

People ask us - "Isn't it possible to heat my whole house with electricity? Why not small heaters in every room, or an electric furnace in the basement?

In a nutshell, the answer is this: Electric heat is practical 1 a SMALL SPACE (such as a bathroom) for a SHORT TIME (one or two hours' use per day). But at present it is not economical for heating for long periods or for large rooms. And it is NOT an economical means of providing additional heat to raise the temperature from 65 to 70 degrees throughout your entire house. There are several reasons why this is so.

First, electric heat is highly refined heat made from coal, and a great deal of heat is lost in the process. If you had 5 tons of coal to turn into electric heat, the heat of 4 tons of coal would be lost in the change-over, and the heat equivalent of only ONE TON would be delivered to your home. The most efficient electric power plants today can extract in the form of refined electric heat about 20 per cent of the heat originally in the coal. But if you burn the coal in your furnace, you can extract 50 to 60 per cent of its crude heat in useful warmth.

Second, electricity must be made the instant it is being used and on cold days each home would require about 80 times as much as it uses normally. The extra power plant equipment to produce enough electricity to heat houses on a cold day would be partly idle on a warmer day; and it would be completely idle all summer. But the expense would continue the year round, and to cover this all-year expense, the cost of electricity would be high.

All the above pertains to house heating. Electricity is, of course, highly economical for steadier uses like water heating, cooking or other uses of refined heat requiring closer control.


