## Another Clarkston Boy Enlists in Navy

The most recent arrival at the U. S. Naval Training Station at Great Lakes, Ill., from Clarkston, Mich., is Charles Raymond Beach, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Beach, 6756 Dixie Highway. He reported to begin recruit training last week.

Now classified as a "boot", this new recruit is being trained and instructed in various fundamental phases of naval routine, hardened through the Navy's vigorous physical toughening program, and will soon graduate from recruit training a full-fledged Bluejacket. At that time, he will be granted a nine-day leave at which time he may come home.

Recruits in the Navy have a selection of 49 different trades to learn in the various Navy Training Schools if they qualify when taking their aptitude tests during recruit training. Graduation from a Navy Service School makes a man eligible for a petty officer's rating.

## Pre-Pearl Harbor Dance

This evening in the High School Gymnasium, the regular dance, sponsored by the Clarkston Rotary Club, for the Community, will be under the direction of Robert L. Jones, Executive Chairman, and Gerald O'Dell, Retail Chairman, of the United States War Bond and Stamp Sale Drive.

Clarkston and vicinity has been well up near the top on war bond and stamp sales. The month of December a campaign has been organized in Oakland County to sell an additional three hundred thousand dollars worth of Bonds and Stamps. Every one of the bonds or stamps converted into bonds, that have a bomber stamp affixed to it, will be applied to this fund. If this amount is raised the Government will name a bomber after the County. Calling it "Pride of Oakland County" or some other suitable name to be selected.

Bomber stamps are available thru either Messrs. Jones or O'Dell and applications for bond purchases can be secured from the members present at the dance.

Regular prices of twenty and thirty cents will be charged for admission to the dance and the music will be furnished by the High School Orchestra, under the leadership of Walter Wainosky, Director of Music.

A special talk will be given during the intermission, by a member of the County Bond Sales Committee, applications will be available to anyone wishing to sign up for the purchase of bonds, or they may be purchased outright at the dance.

- If you are ...
