Use LOW heat to finish most of your surface cooking, after foods have reached the steaming point. When the cooking operation is almost completed, the heat may be turned completely OFF. COOKING LIGHTING

LIGHTING. Dust steals light and wastes electricity. Wipe all lamp bulbs frequently, also reflector bowls and ceiling fixtures. Use the right size lamp in the right socket. Dark colored lamp shades soak up light. Use light-colored shades wherever possible, or try fitting dark shades with a white lining.

APPLIANCES. Don't leave appliances turned on when temporarily not in use (your electric iron or toaster, for example). Pull the plug, and connect the appliance again later when you are ready to use it. Defrost your refrigerator regularly. Don't overcrowd your refrigerator. Unless the motor is hermetically sealed, have it oiled and inspected regularly.
