

ARMY NAVY COLLEGE TRAINING PROGRAM

The bureaus of Army and Navy Personnel of the United States have arranged with civilian agencies to administer the qualifying tests for the Army or Navy College Training Program which is known as the V-12 program for the Navy and the A-12 program for the Army.

High school seniors, high school graduates, and college students who appear to have potentialities for ultimate selection as officers will be chosen for college training. The plan contemplates that this college training will be carried on while the men are on active duty, in uniform, receiving pay, and under general military discipline.

those colleges and universities where such training can best be given. Please note that not only high school and college students are eligible to take the test, but any high school graduate in this vicinity. The test will be given at the High School in Clarkston at 9:00 a. m. on April 2, 1943.

Those students who prefer the Navy program should fill out the "Admission and Identification Form for Navy College Training Test V-12". Those who prefer the Army program should fill out the "Admission and Identification Form for the Army College Training Test A-12". Those who have no preference may use either card, noting that they have no preference. In either case, the card should be properly filled out and presented by the candidate to the supervisor at the time of the test.

For the Army Training Program all male applicants in the following groups are eligible to take the test as Army candidates:

- (a) High school and preparatory school graduates who will have attained their 17th but have not reached their 22nd birthdays by July 1, 1943, regardless of whether they are now attending college.
(b) High school and preparatory school seniors who will be graduated by July 1, 1943, provided they will have attained their 17th, but have not reached their 22nd birthdays by that date.
(c) Students who will have attained their 17th but have not reached their 22nd birthdays by July 1, 1943, who do not hold certificates of graduation from a secondary school but who are now continuing their education in an accredited college or university.

For the Navy Training Program all male applicants in the following groups are eligible to take the test as Navy candidates:

- (a) High school and preparatory school graduates who will have attained their 17th but not their 20th birthdays by July 1, 1943, regardless of whether they are now attending college.

(b) High school and preparatory school seniors who will be graduated by July 1, 1943, provided they will have attained their 17th, but have not reached their 20th birthdays by that date.

(c) Students who will have attained their 17th but have not reached their 20th birthdays by July 1, 1943, who do not hold certificates of graduation from a secondary school but who are now continuing their education in an accredited college or university.

The eligibility of an individual for the Army or Navy Training program is not fully established until he has successfully completed the normal twelve or thirteen weeks of basic military training immediately following his induction into the Army or Navy. Success on the proposed test, however, will provide the candidate with a certificate of qualification which, upon presentation at the time of voluntary or regular induction, will assure his assignment to a Replacement Training Center as a potential Army Specialized Training Program trainee. If it is then determined that he is potential officer candidate material, he will be assigned to an Army or Navy Specialized Training Unit as an enlisted man on active duty, receiving the pay of a private seventh grade, to pursue a curriculum of study for which he has shown himself qualified.

Don't forget to secure your application forms at the high school so that you will be eligible to take the test on April 2, 1943, starting promptly at 9:00 a. m.

The taking of this test does not constitute enlistment into the armed forces, but if you plan to enlist or are very near to the draft, it offers you a splendid opportunity for valuable officers training.

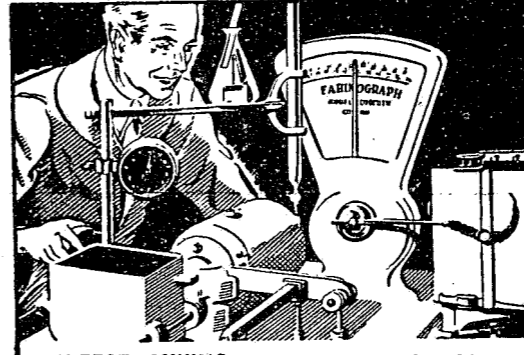

Farm hens may be considered worthy of an "E" award like factory workers, for they, too, have contributed to the war effort in unprecedented production, according to federal reports. Recent data show farm flocks number 372 million laying hens, which is 12 per cent more than a year ago and 23 per cent above the ten-year average. Egg production recently has been as much as 17 per cent greater than in corresponding periods a year ago.

Realizing the normal seasonal increase in eggs and consequently economical yields in spring, the Kroger Grocery and Baking Co. has planned a special Victory Egg Sale for late March and April. With meat in restricted quantity, eggs are selected by many housewives as allies to furnish high nutritive food.

Eggs are rated by nutritionists as especially rich in protein, vitamin A, and such minerals as iron and phosphorus. The national nutrition rules recommend at least three or four eggs weekly for each person in the family.

While eggs form an important part of the military diet, still this is one food not rationed and civilians are assured adequate supplies because of increased production goals met by farmers and commercial poultrymen.

short of meat will learn to know the dish. After trapping your turtle, he says, kill it by cutting off the head, then hang it by the tail overnight to drain. Skin out the quarters and take the fat off them. Parboil 15 minutes with a small onion, remove and wash clean. Then boil again with a small onion and lump of butter as big as a hen's egg until the meat begins to come off the bones. Remove and take out the bones, and make a pot roast of the meat with butter; salt and pepper to taste. Add green peas, mushrooms or asparagus to the broth, season and thicken it as you would chicken soup, and eat it with crackers.
