How serious is the threatened feed shortage in Michigan? Will livestock numbers have to be reduced?

These questions, asked by Michigan ivestock farmers, have been analyzed by K. T. Wright, farm management specialist at Michigan State College. Available feed left over from the record 1942 crops on the average farm in the state was, on July 1 twice the amount normally left per





The department warns gardeners that its hands are tied as far as aiding gardeners whose plots lie within city limits, and stipulates that its permits may not be construed to exceed local municipal regulations. Police of some lower Michigan cities, however, realizing the serious threat that this rabbit-pheasant problem constitutes to the coming winter's food supply, have relaxed local re-strictions and are permitting regulatscavengers" within municipal limits.

Department officials are advising helpless gardeners, whose gardens are located in areas where local restrictions prohibit shooting, that nicotine dust sprayed on plants has been found to be an effective repellent for rabbits. They admit, however, that there is no sure way of exterminatng pheasants except shooting.

### Corn Stocks Requisitioned

The War Food Administration has requisitioned the corn stocks in 96 midwestern terminal elevators in a further effort to break the distribution jam that has prevented corn processing plants from obtaining 89,974.08 supplies with which to produce feed and industrial products essential to the war effort. Farmers have been reluctant to sell corn at ceiling prices (\$1.07 per bushel, Chicago basis) because corn is worth more when fed to hogs than sold as corn. Speculatve buyers also have held corn firmly.

> The closing down of corn processng plants seriously cripples war production of explosives, aluminum, nagnesium, and other war products WFA officials said. Inability of feeders and mixed feed producers to obtain supplies is detrimental to the production of livestock, poultry and
