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

Residential **Neating Season** Conservation

- 1. Prepare home for Winter season through insulation, weather stripping and storm windows.
- 2. Close off all unused sooms,
- 3. Eliminate garage heating
- 4. Never use the cooking range for heating
- 5. Reduce home temperature to 65 degrees.
- 6. Reduce temperature to 55 degrees at night and when homes are not occupied.




