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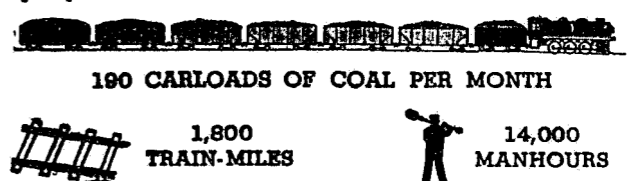
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MUSIC NEWS

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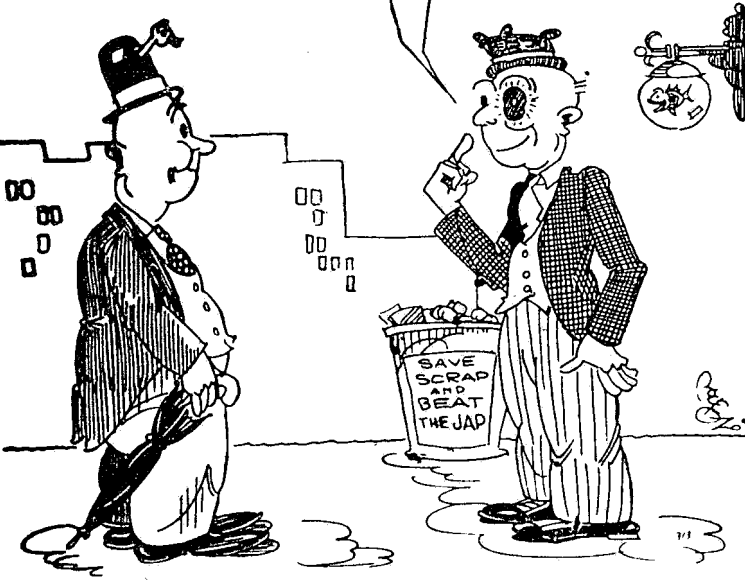

Retail prices for cane syrup have been increased by OPA as a result of refiguring the parity formula, which resulted in increased returns to sugar cane growers.

Ration Reminder—Green stamps A, B and C in book four expire December 20. Green stamps D, E and F are good through January 20.

Because of the critical over-all lumber and pulpwood shortage, which directly affects farmers, who are large users of lumber and wood products, Marvin Jones, War Food Administrator, indicated that farmers should help by: (1) Increasing production from woodlands during the winter, and (2) Providing labor for forest industries during the slack winter season on farms. Lumber used on farms for the construction and maintenance of farm buildings requires three and one-half billion board feet of lumber annually, Jones said.
