## Red Cross News

If a Red Cross Solicitor missed calling on you, maybe you were not at home. Don't let that stop you from giving. Please call Mrs. Howard Lord phone Clarkston 3131 or call the Charles Robinson home 2801, so that someone will arrange to get your contribution. Today is the last day of the 1944 Red Cross War Fund. Dollars given here save lives over there. The Red Cross needs your contribution. Will you do it NOW?

The Oakland County Chapter American Red Cross has already exceeded its quota of \$327,000 according to C. G. Rudderham, War Fund Chairman. Incomplete reports made recently show a total of \$335,815.76. Mr. Rudderham states that even though the quota has been reached all workers in the county are urged to forge ahead to reach the locally established goal of \$500,000. Mrs. T. W. Jackson, township chairman, reports that 12 communities of the county have exceeded their quotas and six are very close to quota figures. It is expected that practically every township will reach its assigned goal.

Independence township reports a total of \$2788.10 against a quota of \$2400. Charles W. Robinson has directed the drive in this township. Brandon township with a quota of \$1350 has secured contributions of \$1415.15 under the leadership of Mrs. Harry Featherstone. Springfield, the first township to exceed its quota has reported collections amounting to \$938.65. The quota in this community was \$600. Rev. Ralph W. Brown is War Fund chairman in this township.

## Methodist Minister, W. Harold Pailthorp, Leaves Clarkston

The resident Minister of the First Methodist Church, The Rev. W. Harold Pailthorp has been appointed by Bishop Raymond J. Wade to the Walnut Street Methodist Church of Howell, Michigan. Rev. Pailthorp served in the local Methodist Church as Pastor for nearly five years. He had previously served six years in two appointments in the Detroit Conference of the Methodist Church and two churches in Indiana and Wisconsin.

During his pastorate one hundred fifty-six members came into the fellowship of the Clarkston and Seymour Lake Churches. At the time of the Centennial Celebration of the Church in 1940 a new organ was installed in the Church and the Chancel of the Sanctuary was re-designed in an older ecclesiastical tradition involving a dossal drapery, an altar table with distinguished brass appointments, a lecturn and different arrangement of the Choir stalls. The use of indirect lighting made the total effect altogether worshipful and beautiful. The Rev. and Mrs. Pailthorp regret to leave a host of friends in the Church and Community.

## More Victory Gardens Needed This Year

At the conference of the National Victory Garden Institute held in Detroit earlier this month the extreme importance of the Victory Garden Program was emphasized by national representatives from all agencies and organizations having to do with the Program. It was pointed out that 43% more canned foods would be required by the government in 1944 than in 1943 and that 19% more canned vegetables would be needed. All Victory Garden Committees were called on to increase the number of gardens by 10% and production by 25%. Captain Donald S. Leonard, state civilian defense director, called the Victory Garden program one of the most important of all civilian war programs. The Clarkston Victory Garden committee this year is composed of William Vliet, Farmer E. Davies, Frank Leonard, A. B. Wompole and James Bennett.

We have one thing to be thankful for here. We never have to do our own laundry. The natives wash all of our clothes, and do a very good job, except for the fact that they tear off all the bright or colored buttons. They can't understand that we have to turn in our worn out clothes for salvage and think it's very foolish for us to ask them to wash the clothes that's as they call it "broke".

I guess all you folks at home have heard that us fellows will be home on furlough this year. Gosh! It's sure going to be great to get back on American soil again. It's been over two years since we left the States and it seems more like ten. I'll never regret the time I've spent overseas, but I just can't wait to get back to Clarkston.

I received several swell letters from Chuck Waid's mother and I hope she hears from Chuck often. If Chuck's mail leaves where he is in the same manner as ours does here his letters will arrive in bunches.

I'm still receiving the Clarkston News and it's mighty welcome as you can imagine. I especially like the letters from the other fellows in the Service.

I was very glad to hear that Frank Powell was home. I know what he has gone through as I have had the malaria myself.

I'll close for this time with many thanks again for the Clarkston News. I hope to see you folks in the near future and till next time
