Plains school ground. The Band  
played "The Star Spangled Banner";  
Boy Scouts raised the Flag after  
which the parade formed in line at  
the school and marched along Sash-  
abaw Rd. to the Dixie Highway and  
to the Drayton Plains Cemetery  
where the ceremony took place. Rev.  
C. J. Sutton opened with prayer; the  
Band played the National Anthem;

War emergencies have made vegetable gardeners of many people who never before expected that it would be necessary for them to produce their own food. The demand for all foods, because of the war emergency, has created scarcities in many food items. Cheaper meat cuts require seasoning and flavoring. This in turn has resulted in greater demand for spices and herbs for flavoring and a consequent scarcity of these products. Home gardeners, therefore, can include in the vegetable garden some herb and spice plants. What kinds

will succeed and how much to grow are problems for the home gardener. Dill is easily grown in almost any backyard garden. The average family will not need more than 2 to 5 feet of a row. A packet of seed would be sufficient for a number of families. Seeds, leaves or stems may be used for flavoring pickles, meats, fish, soups and sauces. Sow seed in May or June. Salad chervil can be used in the same way and requires essentially the same culture. Can be used either fresh or dried. About 5 feet of row should be ample. Coriander seed is used for flavoring bread, meats, fish, confections and sausage. Sow seed early, and harvest in August as the seed approaches maturity. Depending on family taste requirements, 10 to 25 feet of row could be used. Cumin seeds to be used for flavoring soups, pickles, bread and pastries require a warm light soil. Sow seed in late May or June and harvest in two or three months. Ten to twenty-five feet of row should be ample. Sweet fennel leaves are used for flavoring soups, fish, meat and confectionery. A half-dozen plants are more than enough for any family.

Sow seed in late May or start inside in April. Florence fennel is used much the same as sweet fennel. It has a larger thickened base which may be boiled or may be used raw in salads. Black cumin or fennel flower seeds are used for seasoning. Sow seeds in May for harvest in late summer. Parsley may be sowed at any time with spring planting. Five feet of row should be enough for daily needs and some for drying for winter use. Sweet Basil may be sowed when ground is warm. Four to six plants

should be sufficient. May be used either fresh or dried to flavor meats, fish, soups or sausage. Anise seeds as well as leaves are used for flavoring breads and pastries and as a garnish for salads. It requires about four months to mature seeds. Only a few plants are needed if the leaves are to be used. For seed, sow ten to forty feet of row.
