### Dog Quarantine

### Is Necessary

So Says State Veterinarian In Charge of Work

The State Department of Agriculure has issued the following explanation of the dog quarantine now in

effect in Oakland and 17 other counties, resulting as the Advertiser stated last week in action by the Holly village authorities to see that

both the quarantine regulations and the municipal ordinance relating to "Because of one or more found in-

counties, a quarantine has been placed on these counties by Commissioner of Agriculture, Chas. Figy. All of these counties with diseased dogs are located in southern Michigan, and the counties so quarantined are as follows: Barry, Berrien, Calhoun, Clinton, Eaton, Genesee, Hillsdale, Ingham, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Lenawee, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe,

Oakland, Shiawassee, Washtenaw and Wayne.

"Dr. C. H. Clark, State Veterinarian in charge of control work on dog rabies in Michigan, states that this is the season of the year when the disease outbreak spreads more rapidly and it is necessary in order to get complete control, that all dog owners in the infected area keep their dogs tied or definitely kept from running loose.
