Appeal Made for 12,000 Workers to Save Foods

WMC Urges Men, Women and Youth to Take Paid Vacation Jobs

An urgent call for men, women and youth over 16 to take immediately for work in Michigan canning plants was issued by Edward L. Cushman, director of the War Manpower Commission. Between 12,000 and 15,000 will be needed this season to state to process fruits and vegetables, a large percentage of which are required by the armed forces, Cushman declared.

"The need for canning workers is greater than ever this year and will continue. The armed forces are depending upon this industry for food and ship larger quantities of foodstuffs than ever before.

"Michigan is the world's largest center for processing of string beans and it is of major importance in the processing of fruits and vegetables ranging from strawberries, cherries, raspberries, blackberries, blueberries, currants, peaches, apples, grapes to sweet corn, peas, pickles, navy beans, lima beans, asparagus, tomatoes, kraut, rhubarb and...

"Unless patriotic citizens make themselves available for

important seasonal work, the state will fall down in its obligation to our fighting men and to the country generally. We must not and cannot fail. Our appeal now is to all available persons to register immediately with the nearest office of the United States Employment Service. Many of these jobs are open right at this moment; others will develop within a few days."

Wages and working conditions are good, officials of the Michigan Canners Association point out. There are such jobs as sorting, grading, packing, preparing, labeling, and weighing.

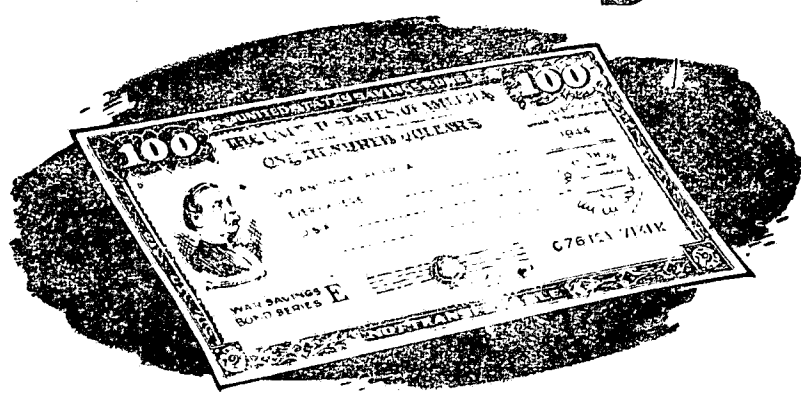
Many workers plan to spend their vacation working in a canning plant and thus combine a paid vacation with helping to process foods for victory. Others plan to spend the entire season in food processing work, moving from one section of the state to another as the work develops.

Such areas as Benton Harbor-St. Joseph, Paw Paw, South Haven, Holland, Kent City, Petoskey, Muskegon, Fremont, Hart, Ludington, Manistee, Traverse City, Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Ionia, Owosso, Jackson, Saginaw, Bay City, Port Huron, Monroe, Adrian, Crosswell and Detroit are in need of cannery workers.

Seeks Re-Election
Congressman George A. Dondero, with 12 years of experience on the important Committee on Rivers and Harbors and the highest ranking Republican position on the Committee on Education, again seeks reelection on the Republican ticket, as Representative in Congress for the 17th Michigan district. RICE pudding has been, will be, is a satisfying dish.



It's very healthful, pleases all. What more can woman wish? Grandmother had her recipe Mother's was strictly new. Times change—and so do recipes

So this one is for you.

Rice Pudding

1 package prepared vanilla cornstarch pudding; 2 1/2 cups milk; 1 cup cooked rice; cubes of jelly.

Place pudding powder in saucepan. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly. Place over medium flame and cook until mixture comes to a boil and is thickened, stirring constantly. Fold in rice. Cool, stirring occasionally. Turn into dessert dishes. Chill. Garnish with cubes of jelly. Makes 6 servings.

Raisin Rice Pudding. Add 1/4 cup raisins and 1/4 cup orange each nutmeg and cinnamon to pudding powder before cooking.

Mexico now has four penicillin laboratories, all of which plan to produce several million units of penicillin a day, the Office of the Coordinator of Inter-American Affairs reports. 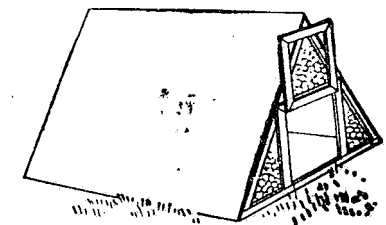


Simple Range Shelter

THIS is the year to make every piece of equipment that we now have on the farm keep going, every acre and cow and hen produce its best, every day and every lick count.

Our fighting men need plenty of food, and we must produce it. One soldier, for instance, needs enough meat to equal 500 pounds of broilers each year. That means that more broilers are going to have to come off the farm than ever before.

Now that the broiler raising season is getting into full swing, many farmers are faced with the problem of providing range shelter for flocks. Illustrated below is a cheap range shelter for 6-week-old broilers, which helps the flock get green feed and gives them elbow room.



The shelter is simply constructed and requires a minimum of labor and critical materials. It is made of asbestos cement board applied on a V-shaped frame, with wire stretched across the open ends. A small door covered with wire is used on the front. Since asbestos board is rodent-proof and weather-proof, the shelter will last a long time.

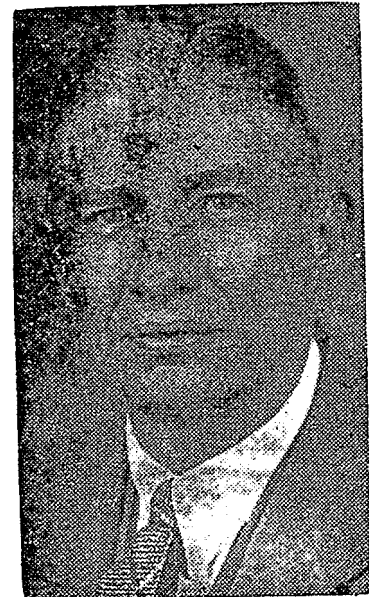

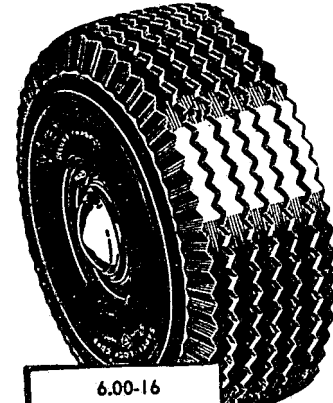

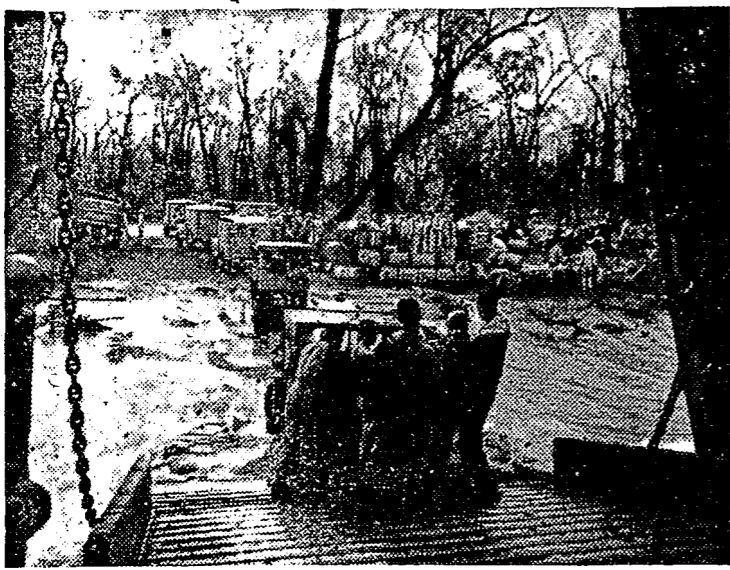

Old-Time Cradlers Will Contest July 8

Event of Tithing Project Attracting Wide Notoriety

Nationwide interest will focus upon a wheat tithing project and old-timers' cradling contest scheduled July 8 at Tecumseh, Mich., to reap 14 acres of grain planted from the parent wheat of one cubic inch used for seed originally in 1940.

With the Tecumseh Friends church to get its annual one-tenth of the harvest in the six-year venture, on-lookers will watch three classes of contestants, grouped by age.

According to Perry Hayden, Tecumseh miller and sponsor of the project, cradlers bringing their own ancient equipment will be matched up to 59 years as juniors, from 60 to 79 as hustlers and from 80 years and up as pioneers.

The wheat selected and planted in 1940 is Bald Rock, a variety developed by plant breeders at M. S. C. The original 360 kernels produced 18,000 in 1941, with one-tenth to the church. The harvest in 1942 was 70 pounds, a 55 fold return, and seven pounds worth 11 cents went to the church. In 1943 the yield was 17 bushels, threshed out at Michigan State College.

The 1943 plantings to be harvested this month cover 14 acres of land provided by Henry Ford.

Cradling contest judges will be Charles Figy, state commissioner of agriculture; Roy E. Decker, head of the college farm crops department, and Garfield Farley, Albion, a director of the Michigan Crop Improvement association. Points for scoring will be evenness of stubble, uniformity in row of cut grain, uniformity of swath and scarcity of gleanings.

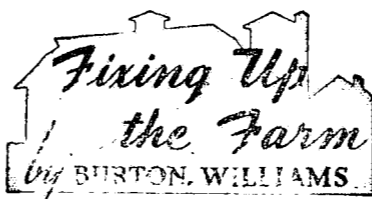

Find the Easy Way

WAR or peace, the essentials of good farm management change very little. There are many hard ways, and one easy way, to do every farm job. You may find that a little time spent analyzing the equipment and ways of doing things on your farm will pay big dividends in time and toil saved.

A good method to use in making a survey of this sort is to ask yourself a few questions. Does this have to be done? Can it be done in easier way? Can one man do instead of two? Will changing the order of work make it easier? Is there a better tool or piece of equipment?

As you will find that just a little time spent on the simple idea of a big difference in saving time and trouble. One such thing is suggested below.

In order to prevent sagging and ballooning of a log gate, put a screw in the end of it. This will hold down the life of the gate, besides making it a lot easier to use. You probably can find several old wheels around the place that will do the trick, and it's an easy job to fasten it to the gate.

Suggestions on How to Cook Poultry

Timely Now as Supply Will Soon Be Ample

Old hens and spring chickens will crowd markets near places where they are raised during the next six months. The supply of chickens for sale will be heaviest in July, August and September.

Shortage of feed will cause many farmers to cull their flocks sharply to get rid of loafer hens and even some layers. Limited facilities will make difficulties in shipping many of these birds far, so local markets will get most of them. Scarcity of storage space for the heavy supply of chickens will mean that chickens must be canned or frozen for next winter's use—or eaten now to prevent waste.

For the homemaker who has a savory chicken supper in mind, home economists at M. S. C. suggest these rules for cooking poultry:

1. Know a young chicken from an old, and cook according to the right method for the age of the bird. Marks of youth in chickens are flexible cartilage on rear end of breast-bone, tender skin, soft meat, few hairs, and soft smooth feet. Broil, fry or open-pan roast young, tender, well-fatted birds. Braise in a covered casserole or covered roaster lean young birds or hens past their prime for roasting. Cook very old birds long and slowly in water or steam. Then strip meat from the bone and use as a base for dishes cold or hot, such as chicken salad, chicken a la king,

chicken loaf, croquettes or souffle.

2. Cook birds of any age at moderate heat so the meat will be juicy, tender, and evenly done to the bone with little shrinkage. This way of cooking is economical of fowl and fuel.

3. When poultry, either raw or cooked, must be stored a day or two, keep it cold. After it is cooked, if it is not to be eaten immediately, chill it quickly.
