**Picture To Be Shown At Waterford Church**

"They Live Forever," a full-color sound motion picture, dealing with the spiritual aspects of World War II, will be shown at the Waterford Community Church on Friday, Nov. 24 at 8 o'clock, according to the Rev. Wright Van Plew, pastor.

The film was produced by Lewis A. Moon, of the Moody Bible Institute extension staff, and is being distributed under the Institute's auspices to army camps and naval training stations. Rev. John Mead, a chaplain of the Institute's extension staff, will present the picture on Friday evening.

The film's supreme color sequence were photographed by Mr. "Doc" while touring army and navy camps with his "Sermons from Science".

Col. George S. Clarke, last major officer to leave Bataan before its capitulation to the Japanese, is one of the principals featured in the picture, whose testimony, as well as those of Lt. James C. V. and Sgt. John Bart, whose life and experiences are graphically related, are featured in the film, along with a series of training shot taken in both army and navy camps.

In the version of the film being shown here, a sequence is devoted to some of Mr. Moon's "Sermons from Science," demonstrations, including samples of photomicrography, bio-time photographs of a living flower and pictures of crystal growth under a polariscope. There are other scenes of an active volcano erupting, and a delicate operation on a human heart.

Admission is free, and all are invited to attend.

- Pumpkin Chiffon Pie**

| 1 tbsp. gelatin           | 1/2 tsp. salt             |
| 1/2 cup cold water        | 2 tbsps. butter           |
| 1 1/2 cups cooked pumpkin | 1/2 cup milk              |
| 1 cup brown sugar         | 3 eggs, separated         |
| 2 tpsps. cinnamon         | 2 tpsps. granulated sugar |
| 1/2 tsp. ginger           | 1 baked pastry shell      |
|                           | 1/4 tsp. allspice         |

Soften gelatin in cold water for five minutes. Combine the next eight ingredients with slightly-beaten egg yolks and cook over low heat until thickened. Add gelatin, and stir until dissolved. Cool until it begins to congeal. Beat egg whites, add sugar and beat until stiff. Fold into pumpkin mixture. Pour into baked pastry shell and chill until firm. Makes one (9-inch) pie.

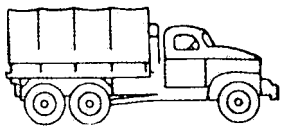
