**CHRISTMAS COOKIES.** For youngsters and elders, too a Christmas recipe from our Home Service Department:

*English Christmas Cookies*

1/2 cup butter  
1 egg  
2 tps. baking powder  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 1/2 cups sifted bread flour

Top layer: 1 tsp. cinnamon  
Granulated sugar  
Egg white  
Blanched almonds if sliced, or cake confetti or colored sugar

Cream butter, add sugar gradually, then well beaten egg and the flour and baking powder sifted together. Place in refrigerator overnight. (This dough may also be sliced or rolled out to 1/8-inch thickness or cut in fancy shapes; sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar and arrange nuts on top.) Put through cookie press onto sheets. Brush tops with egg white, sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. You may use colored sugar or cake confetti, if desired. Time, 12-15 minutes. Temperature, 375-400° F.

Winners Come From Long Line of Livestock Raisers

Livestock raising has been a heritage handed down through several generations in families of the two 4-H club youth who were awarded grand championship honors in lamb and beef cattle competition at the Michigan 4-H Show in Detroit December 12 to 14.

The sheep business has been in the family of the champion lamb owner, Delmont Chapman, III, 14 years old, for 85 years. His great grandfather, Austin B. Chapman was the first white man to settle near South Rockwood. The story is told that he traded a homespun overcoat and an Indian pony for 80 acres of land. Cloth for the overcoat was made of wool which his mother took from a sheep, carded and wove. It was on this 80 acres that the family livestock industry got its start.

In 1923, Delmont's father, Delmont Chapman, Jr., went into the purebred sheep business, and has handled several hundred sheep each year. It was only fitting that Delmont III should follow in the footsteps of his father, grandfather, and great grandfather. A brother, Robert, 13, also is keeping the family tradition by raising sheep. Two years ago he had the re-

serve grand champion lamb at the Detroit show.

Matthew Woods, jr., of Marshall, owner of the grand champion beef, also comes from a long line of livestock raisers. His grandfather raised beef many years ago.

But both grand champion winners have had the added advantage of 4-H training, a privilege that their ancestors didn't enjoy.

Agricultural short courses at Michigan State college will open for two months' sessions on January 2. Subjects will be offered in general agriculture, agricultural engineering, commercial fruit production, dairy manufacturing, dairy production, forestry and wildlife conservation, home economics, poultry, and practical floriculture, according to Ralph W. Tenney, short course director.

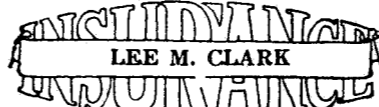

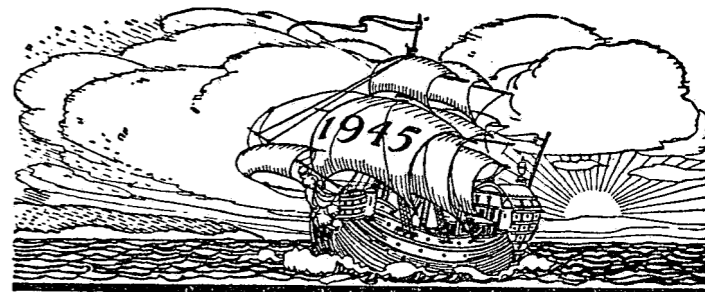
