



1 tbsp. lemon juice cup cake flour 1/8 tsp. salt 1 egg white 1/2 cup finely chopped

Cream the shortening, add sugar gradually and the egg yolk. Beat thoroughly. Add the vanilla, orange rind, lemon iuice, flour and salt. Chill until firm. Mold into small balls. Beat egg white slightly, dip dough into the egg white and roll in chopped nuts. Arrange on a greased cookie sheet and press a slice of cherry in each cookie. Bale in preheated oven. Time, 20 minutes. Temperature, 350° F.


