## Non-highway Gas Issued To Farmers Starting March 1

"Local war price and rationing boards have been advised to begin issuing non-highway rations to farmers on March 1, 1945," W. E. Fitzgerald, OPA district director said today.

The user of non-highway rations will apply for his entire year's requirements through February 29, 1946. Seventy percent of the year's allotment will be issued immediately with each ration bearing an expiration date of six months from the date of issuance. At the end of the six months period the applicant must apply for the 30% balance, if he requires it.

"Farmers should receive all the gasoline rations that they actually need and there should be no delay in issuance; however, we will guard against over issuances and will not give the 30% balance before the expiration date of the 70% issuance unless good cause is shown."

"The AAA certified all applications a year ago and their figures will be used as a guide to determine the proper ration to be issued for 1945. When a ration is asked which is greater than last year's allotment the application may be referred to the AAA for their recommendation," he said.

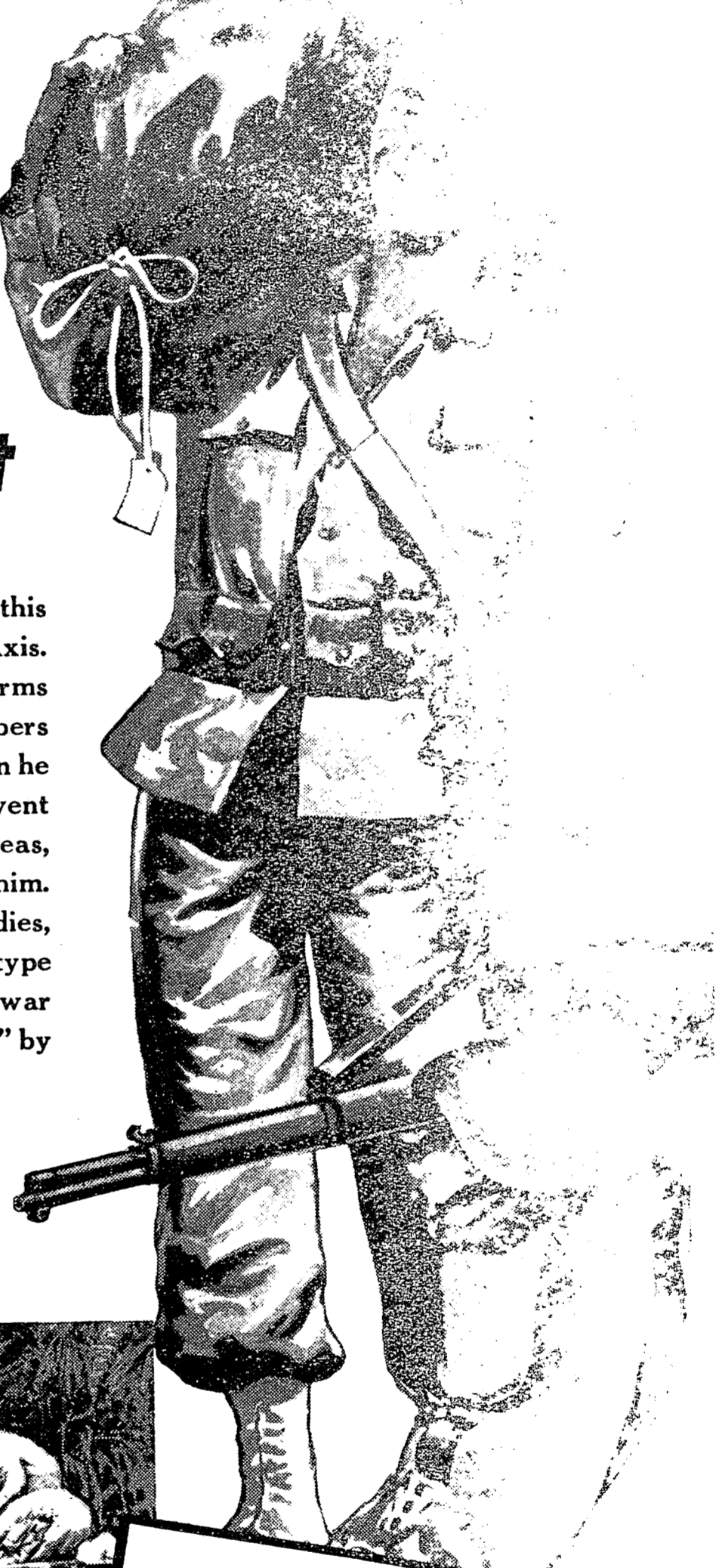

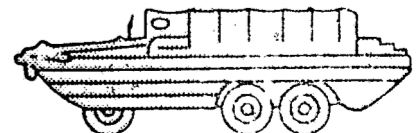
