





Baked Oysters with Spaghetti

1/4 pound spaghetti Salt and pepper 1 cup bread crumbs

1/8 cup melted fat 11/2 cups milk 2 tbs. flour 2 tbs. butter or other fat

Cook spaghetti as directed on package. Scald the oysters in their own liquor, reserving the liquor. Oil a baking dish, put in a layer of the spaghetti and then a layer of the oysters, season with salt and pepper, and repeat the layers until all the oysters and spaghetti are used, finishing with a layer of epaghetti. To the liquor from the oysters, add enough milk to make a pint, reserving a small quantity to mix with the flour. Scald the remainder, add the scalded milk to the moistened flour, stir well and simmer 20 minutes. Add the melted fat and pour over the layers in the dish. Top with bread crumbs mixed with melted fat, and bake in a hot oven (400-450° F.) just long enough to brown the crumbs, about ten minutes.
