Millions of fighting men, freshly outfitted and equipped, will have to be moved from Europe halfway around the globe; and supplied by hundreds of new ships. More of everything will be needed-more B-29's-more tanks, half-tracks, jeeps and trucks-more rockets, mortars and airborne radar. The people of America must see that our fighting men get the equipment that is needed. To raise the vast sum needed every American will have have to dig deeper into current income-dig deeper into cash reserves.






