





**Farmers To Apply For Electric Service**  
The Detroit Edison Company is placing orders for material to erect farm lines and is again able to take applications from farmers to build line extensions following the War Production Board relaxation of restrictions. H. J. Keith, District Agent of The Detroit Edison Company, announces this week.

"We expect to go ahead just as fast as materials and men are available and give service to practically every farmer in our territory," Mr. Keith said. "We already serve some 34,000 farms, or 94 percent, and now that the government has relaxed its controls over work of this kind, we are anxious to finish the job and serve the remaining 2,100 farms to which we are planning to build lines. We believe this will be welcome news throughout our 7,600 square miles of territory and we are delighted that we can start now and present- ly finish the job to make electric service available to everyone in our system," Keith said.




