Corn syrup may well replace art of the sugar and thus extend ts use in canning fruits, in bakng and in preparing summer bevrages, as iced tea and lemonade, according to Jean Allen, home conomist of the Kroger Food oundation.

Honey, molasses and maple syup are also mentioned by Miss Allen as sugar extenders. So imortant have recipes become to tretch the dwindling sugar allownces, that Kroger stores have repared for customers leaflets uggesting substitutes for can-
