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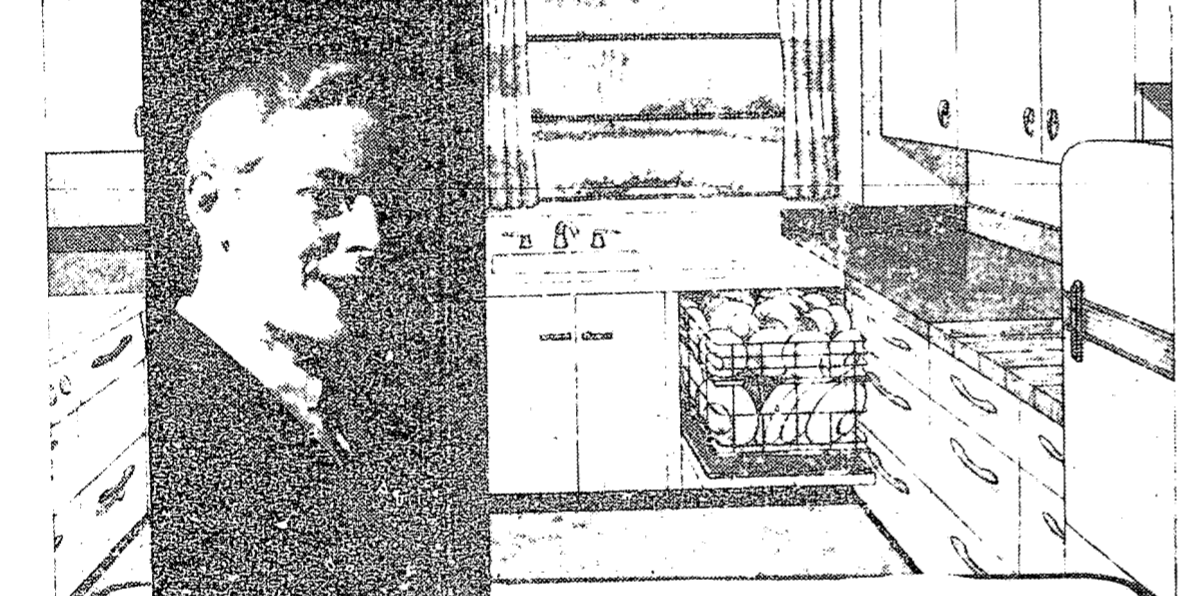
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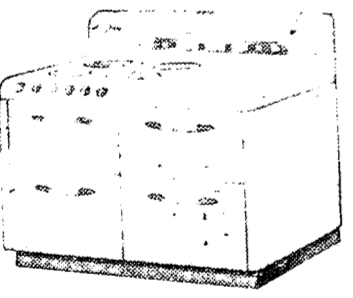
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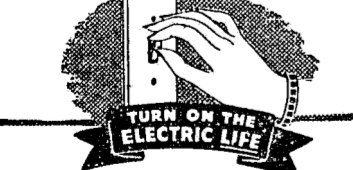

4-H Leaders Receive Recognition

This National 4-H Clover Award is made for the first time this year and is made by the New York Central Railroad who purchased the pins.
