Half-inch slices of green or partially ripened tomato may be salt-sored by the mighty class of "47" and pan fried in bacon fat, oven night. fried or even broiler. Strips of bacon add to the flavor. Dill green tomato pickles may be made without sugar. Pack small, firm fruit into jars and add to each quart, if desired, a bud of garlic, stalk of celery and a cut-up green pepper. Boil 2 quarts of water, 1 quart vinegar and 1 cup salt with dill for 5 minutes. The jars may be sealed as soon as the hot brine has been poured over the tomatoes.

Green tomato mince meat may be made without suet and with little sugar (substitute syrup or honey for 1/3 to 1/2 the sugar). Sprinkle 1 gallon chopped green tomatoes with one tablespoon salt. Let stand 1 hour; drain. Cover tomatoes with boiling water; let stand 5 minutes; drain. Add grated rind and pulp of 1 orange. Mix with 1 cup suet, 3 cups brown sugar, 2 ple or pear, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, and ½ teaspoon ginger. Cook until thick. Process 1 hour in hot



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
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

Grapes can be pruned in the fall after the leaves drop off, says R. E. Loree, research specialist in horticulture at Michigan State college, in answer to many questions from growers.

However, he advises waiting until early spring unless the grower anticipates being too busy at that time of year. Grape vines are generally pruned in February or March, but may be pruned as late as April, he says.

Michigan's wildlife has been one of the state's most valuable assets to the time Indians depended on it for food, clothing, and shelter to the present when the public depends on it for health and recreation more and more each year.

There's only one way to skin cat in the conservation department's book-that's to let the bounty claimant do it.

The department has announced that it will approve bounty payments on predators only when whole pelts are turned in, the rule applying to bobcats taken in the upper peninsular, wolves, and coyotes. Bounties are paid for wolves and coyotes taken below the Straits and hunters often have dragged carcasses inthe departments's Lansing office to the distress of swivel chair conservation workers.
