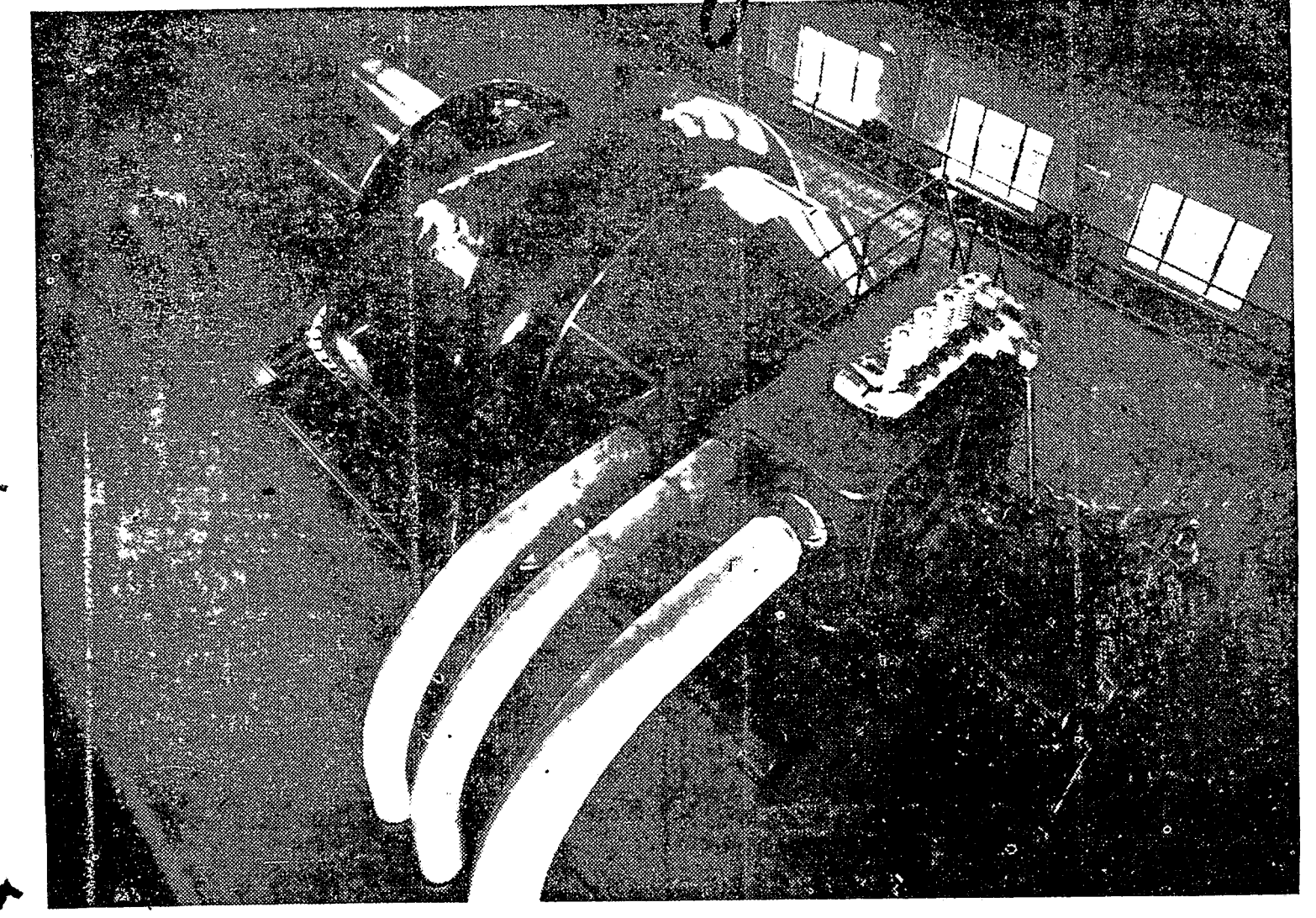

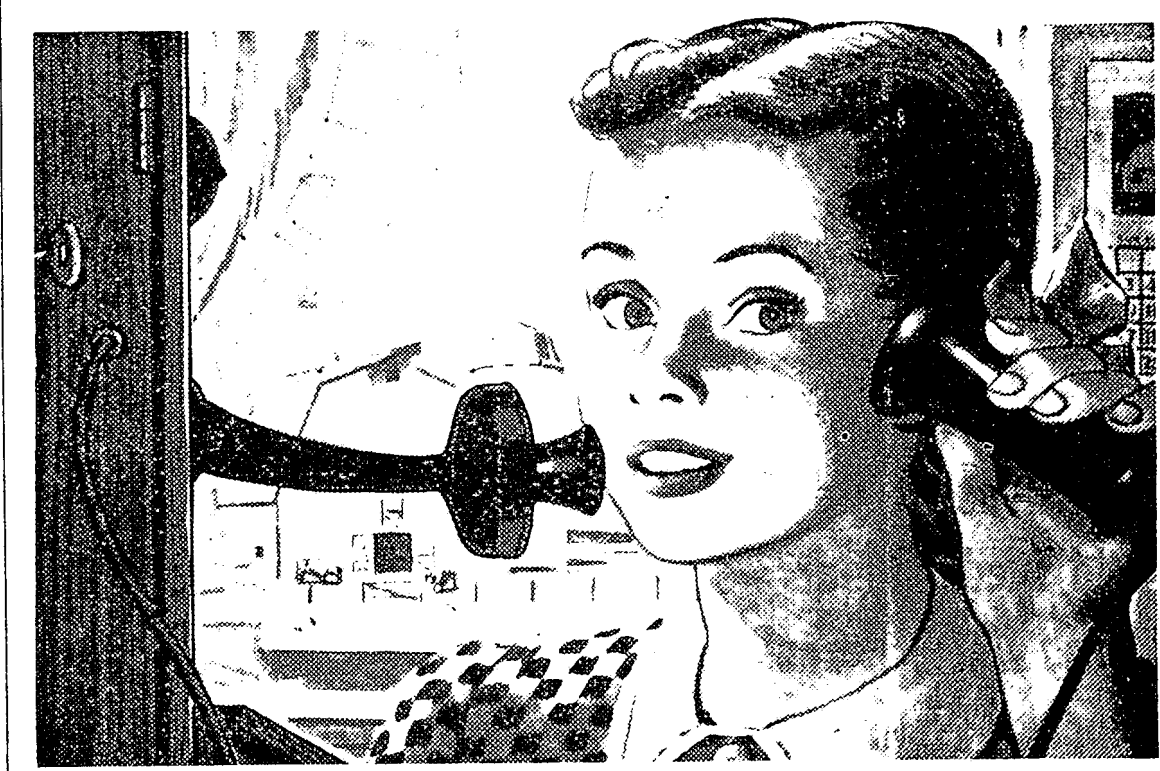

GOOD RURAL LINE NEIGHBORS share the wires



THERE are more telephones today on most rural lines than before the war. This is because there were so many "war-essential" rural folks who had telephones installed. And because of shortages of materials and manpower, we weren't able to expand the system sufficiently. Now that the war is over, we are resuming our rural expansion and improvement program. As sufficient trained manpower and materials become available, we shall be able to add enough new lines so there again will be fewer telephones per line. Meanwhile, the best way for everybody to have good service is to treat his telephone neighbors as he himself would like to be treated: keep all calls short... avoid listening in or interrupting when the line is in use... hang up the receiver carefully. One receiver off the hook can tie up a whole line.


