**Here is 1946
Fertilizer Outlook**
The 1946 fertilizer outlook for Michigan farmers is resented by Dr. C. E. Millar, head of the Michigan State college soil science department. This report is the result of a recent conference on the college campus of division managers and field representatives of companies selling fertilizer in Michigan.
1. The same grades of fertilizer will be recommended and offered for sale this year as in 1945, with the exception that 0-6-18 is removed from the list.
2. Supplies of superphosphate of regular grades will be somewhat greater than during the past year. Production of the treble superphosphate or 45 percent super-

phosphate will still be below what is needed. This means that mixed fertilizer grades of higher plant food content cannot be increased to any extent.
3. Prospects indicate an adequate supply of ammonium nitrate for use on fruits and vegetables. Because of the decrease in steel manufacture, supplies of sulphate of ammonia will be short, and hence, the manufacture of grades containing a high percentage of nitrogen may be restricted.
4. Although more potash will be mined this year than in 1945, limitations in transportation are preventing it from being moved rapidly to the factories.
Farmers intending to use fertilizer this year are urged by Dr. Millar to place their orders as soon as possible to assure themselves fertilizer when they must have it.

Conservation News
Dune slopes in Muskegon state park are to provide thrills for skiers as part of Michigan's winter sports program.
Muskegon Ski Club members will work with the conservation department's state parks organization in clearing downhill ski runs and trails. The club hopes to erect a ski tow. Existing toboggan facilities at the park also are being readied for the winter season.
Members of the park organization have returned from a meeting of the National Ski association held in Milwaukee where the Michigan conservation department was the only state agency represented. Convention members heard about Michigan's ambitious postwar effort to re-establish itself as a major winter recreation area.
At least 18 winter sports areas in upper and lower peninsulas will be reopened, largest being the Grayling winter sports park, where the season got under way on December 29. The state park organization will operate the Grayling park in coming months.
Other principal winter sports areas, most of which will be opened to the public early next month are at Ishpeming, Iron Mountain, Ontonagon, Ironwood, Wakefield, Gladstone, Hancock, and Marquette in the upper peninsula; Silver Valley near East Tawas, Alpena, Petoskey, Cadillac, West Branch, Vanderbilt, and Roscommon below the straits.

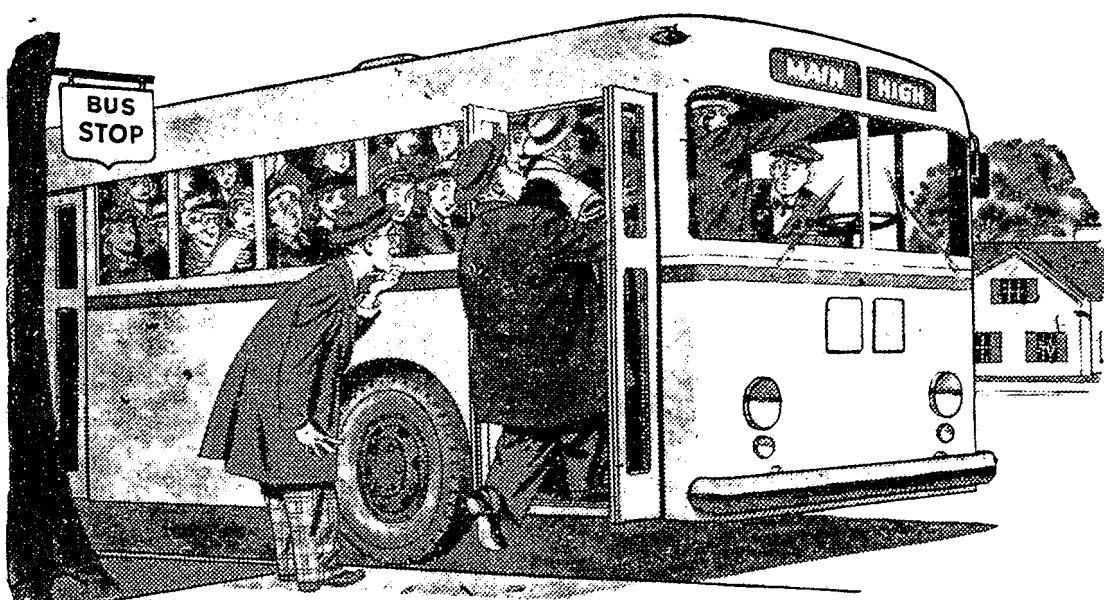

(continued from page 1) customer per 3 tenths of a mile. Although the rate per tenth mile in excess of the initial allowance would remain at \$27, the cost could be pro-rated among those served by the extension and charged for at a rate of 45 cents a month per one tenth mile. As customers are subsequently added to the line the monthly charge for construction would be recalculated, thus reducing the cost per customer or eliminating it entirely.

For those who wished to pay the complete construction charge in advance, the cost would continue to be \$24 per tenth mile, and rebates would be made if other customers joined the line. There would continue to be no charge for connecting the main line to the house up to 500 feet from the highway. A charge of 5 cents per lineal foot would be made beyond this distance.

Dawson said that Michigan Bell's rural program for the next 5 years will cost \$13,500,000. It will be a major item in the company's \$120,000,000 postwar expansion project to improve and extend telephone service in Michigan. "Two things that will be done for rural customers as rapidly as possible is installation of more lines in order to reduce the number of customers per line, and replacement of manual units with dial equipment. Since 1940 when the previous liberal farm program went into effect, Michigan Bell has built 1,100 miles of rural line, serving 4,800 families, and installed service for approximately 30,000 additional farm customers.

Today there are 66,500 rural telephones in service in Michigan Bell territory, which covers 36 percent of the state's total area—twice as many telephones as in 1930, the pre-depression peak. "The post war construction program will bring telephone service to still more thousands of rural families," Dawson said.

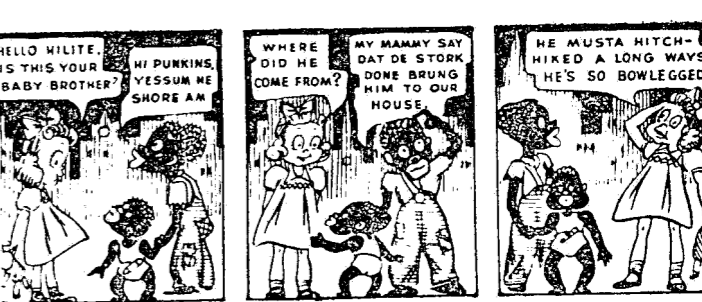
