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





Keep Orchard Clean To Reduce Disease

Sanitation in the orchard is not a substitute for spraying, says Donald Caton, associate professor of botany at Michigan State college. But he stresses that sanitation will greatly increase the tests at the college show that disease can be controlled more readily with fewer and weaker sprays when the spore population is kept at a minimum by orchard sanitation practices.

Mr. Caton observes that many growers question the results of sanitation in their own orchards because the neighbors do not follow similar practices .The botanist advises us not to worry too much about the neighbors, because the spores dilute quite rapidly if they travel any distance. It's the spore load in the immediate area of a tree that offers the most danger.
