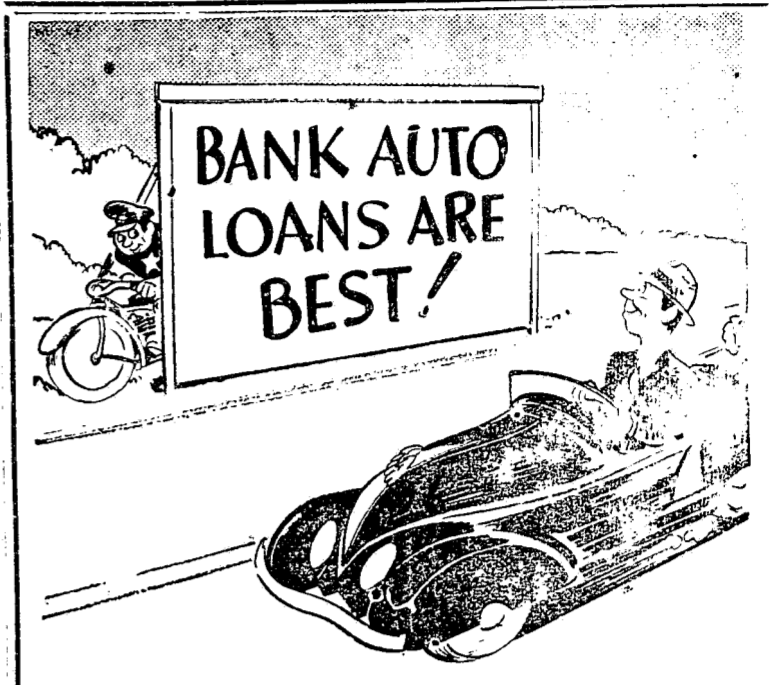
growers sources of certified seed if they need assistance.
 Certified seed potato varieties now available include: Russet Rural, Chippewa, Sebago and Menominee. In discussing the various varieties, Moore points briefly to these facts:
 Russet Rural—One of the most popular late varieties. Most growers succeed with it better than new varieties.
 Chippewa—A medium early potato that seems to replace the Irish Cobbler; is forging ahead in Michigan.
 Sebago—A good late producing white skinned potato.
 Menominee—Especially recommended as scab resistant, also late blight resistant. Worth a good test.
 The extension specialist reveals that many growers are finding their potatoes affected with late blight this spring. Blighted potatoes have shrunken, purplish or lead colored spots on the skin, and the flesh under the shrunken areas shows a brownish discoloration. Since they produce weak tubers, seed should be carefully inspected. Two or three sortings of the seed in good light at two-week intervals may be necessary to remove unsatisfactory seed.

Potato Growers Must Get Certified Seed Ordered Now
 Michigan potato growers are urged to place their orders for certified seed immediately. H. C. Moore, Michigan State college farm crops extension specialist, reports the supply of most varieties as quite limited. County agents or the farm crops department at the college can furnish

SPRAY FRUIT TREES BEFORE LEAVES START
 Dormant sprays are necessary to protect tree fruits against plant pests according to Karl D. Bailey, County Agricultural Agent. If weather continues warm, all dormant sprays must be applied as soon as possible regardless of what comes later. A few more warm days may be too late.
 Home gardeners should use 3 percent dormant oil on apples, plums, sweet cherries and pears. Peaches, however, should be sprayed with liquid lime sulphur using 5 gallons of the lime-sulphur to 100 gallons of water. This is for the control of leaf curl, a disease which malforms the leaves in early June. Mr. Bailey cautions that lime-sulphur should not be used with oil or DN compounds because of injury.
 Sprays should not be applied when rain or snow is likely to follow soon or when the temperature is below 40 degrees.

ECONOMIC CLASS HEARS MR. BUTTERS

Tuesday, March 19th, the Economic class enjoyed hearing Mr. Butters talk about his vocation, salesmanship. Mr. Butters works for Bennett-Ireland Co. in Norwich, New York. He sells fireplace installations and hoist farm implements.

At the beginning of his talk he passed out a catalog which described his products. The catalog has three pamphlets which describe building fireplaces, fireplace furniture and farm machinery.

Mr. Butters is a traveling salesman or a field representative. It is his responsibility to sell products to implement trade stores and lumber yards. He represents the lower peninsula of Michigan and upper peninsula of Michigan from Manistee to Munising. He also has 35 counties in Indiana from Fort Wayne to South Bend, and 46 counties in Ohio which include the Toledo, Cleveland, Akron and Columbus areas.

Mr. Butters told that he is responsible for selling the goods and to look after the welfare of the product after it is sold. Lots of salesmen have weak spots in covering the territory. The House can determine who is a smart salesman by the number of sales he gets. To be a good salesman you must travel around and not stay in one place. When you deal with buyers your dealing organizations grow from day to day. You pick up new customers all the time. He told that he has worked in Michigan from 1935 to 1941 inclusive, and now has built up a good dealers' organization. It takes 5 to 6 years to build up a good one.

The different organizations of salesmanship are: 1. House; 2. Salesman; 3. Wholesaler; 4. Dealer; and 5. Consumer. Wholesalers have salesmen which sell to the dealer and dealers sell to customers. The salesmen sell to the jobbers and retailers. The legitimate jobber is a house that operates a storage warehouse and has salesmen with catalog describing the products.

The qualifications of a salesman are as follows:
Physically: He must be in average health, no conspicuous disabilities, and must be strong enough to drive long distances, and he must fit in with the customers.

Psychologically: He must like the business and be stimulated by people.
Socially: he must be well schooled, fit into groups, be welcomed, leave with a desire to come back, not be a bore and meet intelligent people intelligently.

Educationally: he needs a high school education and could use a university education.
Income: he receives a drawing

account, minimum of \$50 and expenses. He also receives commissions on the goods that he sells. The average income that he may receive is \$3,000 a year.
Advantages: he can always dress up and make his own working conditions, he is his own boss and can work as he sees fit.
Disadvantages: he is usually away from home, he eats out most of the time and lives in hotels.
Mr. Butters also explained to us the difference between a "buyers market" and a "sellers market."

A salesman should be able to give intelligent information. He should be able to carry on a good conversation. He should be polite and go away after making a sale being friends of the buyer. One needs friends to do good business. He should know when he has made a wrong remark and should watch the buyer's expression. His speech should be of average quality. A salesman meets all kinds of people, good, bad and indifferent.

PRUNE PEACH TREES FOR BETTER FRUIT

Prospects for an excellent peach crop for Michigan orchardists is predicted by Don Hootman, extension horticulturist at Michigan State college, who warns that March and April are the months to do a thorough job of pruning the trees.

To increase the size and the flavor of the product, and to prevent exceedingly heavy loads on the trees, Hootman says it is necessary to begin immediately to prune away about half of the live buds.

The winter season this year was mild enough that there was no winter bud killing of the peach trees. A temperature lower than 10 degrees below zero is usually necessary to kill the buds.

"Prune away the thin, weak, wood and grow better quality peaches on the more vigorous wood in the tree," is the advice from the horticulture specialist.
