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Red Cross Drive To Continue

The 1946 Fund Campaign of the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, will be continued for two more weeks according to H. Russell Holland, chairman of the campaign. To date but \$93,646 has been collected in the county which means that \$99,853 must be secured in the next two weeks in order to make the county quota of \$193,500.

Judge Holland urges all workers to continue to solicit, making return calls on individuals who were not home during March.

Seven townships have already reached their quotas and it is hoped that many others will have also reached theirs before the end of the week. The townships which have already secured their quotas are: Addison, quota \$300, total funds secured, \$367.25; Highland, quota \$625, total funds secured, \$673.50; Groveland, quota \$250, total funds secured, \$270; Pleasant Ridge, quota \$6000, total funds secured, \$6117; Madison and Lamphier, \$500, total funds secured, \$500.75; Southfield, quota \$7500, total funds, \$7527.60; Waterford quota, \$2508, total funds secured \$2685.

Other townships have reported as follows: Independence, \$850; Springfield, \$381.85; and Brandon, \$625.

Certainly Independence township will meet its quota in the next two weeks. Of course this will take place only if every person contributes. Leave your contribution at the Clarkston State Bank. Explorer Post News

On Sunday, March 24, Clarkston Explorer Post visited the Cranbrook Institute of Science. We hiked from Square Lake Road and Telegraph to Woodward, south, through Bloomfield Hills to Cranbrook road. The grounds and the buildings in Cranbrook are beautiful and as most of the boys had never been there before, it was quite a treat. In the Academy of Arts, painting, sculpturing, handicraft, drawings and photography was observed. In the Institute of Science we saw a mechanical model of the solar system in operation. It demonstrates how the heavenly bodies such as the earth and its moon rotate around the sun. There were hundreds of other exhibits on minerals, astronomy, biology, meteorology and others. This was a very educational trip which we intend to repeat soon, as we could not cover everything in such a short time and on such tired feet.

On Sunday, March 31, we drove to North Bradley, northwest of Midland on U. S. 10. From there we started northeast by compass, to cross the Midland State Game Refuge, our destination being the Tittabawassee river at a point 7 miles north of Sanford. In this area there are no roads except a few fire lines which never seem to run the way we wanted to go. However, there are a lot of rivers and swamps we found out, to our sorrow. We finally found a pipe line running in the same general direction as our course and this led us to the oil fields. Here we learned how the oil field operates. This was new to all of us, including Mr. Ivonen.

In the center of 8 or 10 derricks is a power station consisting of a large diesel engine driving a horizontal wheel about 20 feet in diameter. Under two large eccentric shafts are four or five heavy iron rods, which run out to the derricks, several hundred feet away, and operate the pumps.

After reaching our destination, the Tittabawassee, where we cooked our dinner. We started back by a different route and found the going still rougher, with bigger and better swamps and rivers. We reached North Bradley at sunset, after covering a distance of 15 miles by the compass course and considerably more with the detours taken into count. Arrived home about 10 p. m.
