**Conservation News**

Bog lands of Proud Lake state recreation area near Milford may yet be the first in Michigan to be dedicated as a plant sanctuary, according to a party of botanists surveying the area this weekend.

Representatives of both the Michigan Wildflower association, led by Marjorie Bingham of the Cranbrook Institute of Science, are participating in the survey of this little known Oakland county spot. Rare Michigan orchids are found here, as well as a great variety of native plants in a scenic setting. The area is valued for its scientific and educational qualities, as well as for its natural beauty.

Recommendations by the committees will be presented to the park and recreation division of the conservation department, which is now developing a chain of recreation areas in southeastern Michigan. Dedication of the area to be preserved will require formal action by the state conservation commission.

The move to preserve the few remaining unspoiled "islands" of native Michigan plant habitat began four years ago.
