MR. KENNEDY SPEAKS TO ECONOMICS CLASS
 Mr. Kennedy gave a very interesting talk before the economics class. He told of his field of work and its relationship to the activity of the community. A mortician's work is divided into two main branches—the embalming and the directorial service, which includes the funeral service itself. A person in this business is dealing with mentally upset persons because science tests prove that a person is only 30 per cent efficient at the time of a death in the family. So the mortician must know how and be able to give comfort to the bereaved. The class had many questions to ask Mr. Kennedy and were well satisfied with the answers he gave. The qualifications and training for a mortician are that he must have a high school education and two years of college. Then it is wise for a person interested in this field to serve as an apprentice. A person must be healthy and strong to do the work, because the hours are long. A funeral home must give 24-hour service, seven days a week. The business provides an opportunity for social life as well as any other business, except that most social plans are interrupted. The pay for the work ranges from a low of \$25 a week to a high of \$110 a week. The advantages of the occupation are that it is a year around job, with a paid vacation. If you are in business for yourself, of course the time is less your own but there is the satisfaction of being self employed. You must like the work. A mortician is a respected citizen in the community. The ethical standards are as in any other business—dependability and honesty.

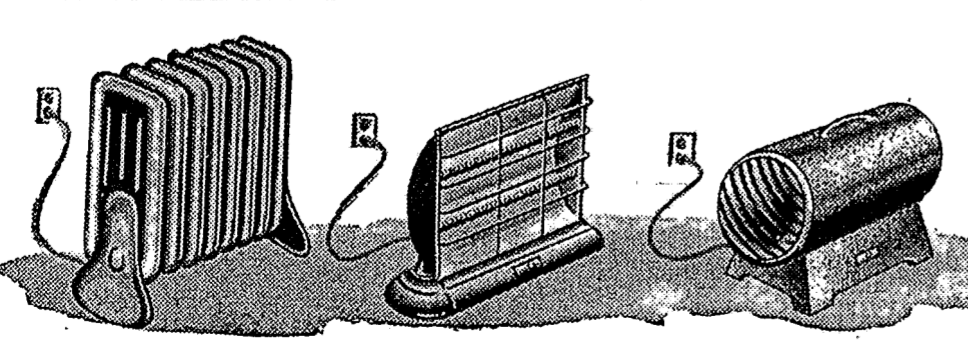

MICHIGAN MILK PRODUCERS ASSOCIATION

CONTACT OFFICES EXPAND SERVICE TO VETERANS
 More than 140,000 veterans brought their problems to Veterans Administration contact representatives throughout Ohio, Kentucky and Michigan during April, Ward J. Oates, director of Contacts and Services for the Veterans Administration branch office in Columbus, announced.

we are expanding the contact service as rapidly as we can. The contact representative is the Veterans Administration official to whom the veteran or his dependents may go for direct information and assistance in all matters pertaining to the Veterans Administration".

In Ohio, an average of 536 personal contacts with ex-servicemen and women a day was made by 116 contact representatives at 38 full-time contact offices. Thirty-three full-time contact offices were operating in Kentucky during the month, 69 contact representatives making over 31,000 personal contacts. In Michigan, 46,988 personal contacts were made, averaging 465 a day for the 101 contact representatives at 25 full-time offices.

In addition to full-time offices, 121 part-time offices were in operation on an itinerant basis in the three states.

Questions and Answers
 Q. Is my mustering-out pay considered as annual income when I apply for a pension?

A. No, according to a recent decision made by the Solicitor, Veterans Administration.

Q. As an employer, I would like to offer on-the-job training to some veterans. How do I go about getting approval of my plan?

A. If you will accept non-disabled veterans for on-the-job training, contact the State Department of Education in your state for approval. If you plan to take disabled veterans as trainees, contact the nearest Veterans Administration office.

Q. As a trainee under the G.I. Bill, am I entitled to any leave?
 A. You are entitled to thirty days annual leave, which includes sick leave.
 Q. What is the largest amount a veteran can borrow under the provisions of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act?
 A. The size of the loan depends on what the lender is willing to lend. The limit placed by the Act is on the amount of guaranty, not on the size of the loan.

Q. If a veteran doesn't want to keep his converted National Service Life Insurance in force, can a beneficiary or his family pay the premiums for him?
 A. Yes, but the veteran retains the right to change the beneficiary at any time, and to surrender the policy for cash at any time.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 36
 AN ORDINANCE to license and regulate Billiard Tables and to prohibit the use of stalls, partitions, anterooms, and rooms adjoining the place where said tables are kept, and which are operated by the owner or proprietor of said tables, and to repeal all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith.

THE VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON ORDINANCES:
 Section 1 That the further use of the word "Pool Room" is hereby prohibited and abolished, and that the words "Billiard Room" and "Billiard Parlor" substituted therefor.
 Section 2 It shall be unlawful for any person to keep for hire any billiard table or pool table within the limits of the Village of Clarkston, without first obtaining a license therefor as hereinafter provided.
 Section 3 Before any license under this ordinance shall be granted, application therefor shall be made to the Village Clerk in writing; said application shall state the name of the applicant, the location of the premises, and the number of billiard and pool tables, also the citizenship of the applicant.
 Before license is issued, applicant shall pay to the Village Clerk the sum of Five Dollars (\$5.00) for one billiard or pocket billiard table so to be kept, operated and maintained, and if more than one billiard table or pocket billiard table is to be kept, operated or maintained the sum of Five Dollars for each additional table.
 The applicant shall also file with the Village Clerk the recommendation of five resident freeholders of the said Village of Clarkston, setting forth that they believe the applicant is a fit person to operate such business.
 Section 4 Upon filing of the application as hereinbefore provided, the same shall be referred to the Chief of Police, for said Village of Clarkston, and if, after investigation by the said Chief of Police, he shall report favorably upon the said application, and if the Village Trustees shall determine that the said applicant is a fit and proper person to conduct and operate then the Village Trustees shall authorize the Village Clerk to issue said applicant a license which shall expire on the 31st day of December subsequent thereto; and in case the application of said applicant is denied, the Village Clerk shall return to the said applicant all license fees which have been paid by the applicant as hereinbefore provided.
 Section 5 The Village Trustees reserve the right under this ordinance to cancel or revoke any license granted hereunder, at any time, when, in its judgment, such action is deemed advisable in case of the revocation of said license, said licensee shall forfeit any and all license fees under the terms of this ordinance.
 Section 6 That all business carried on under the terms of this ordinance shall be in a single room, located on the street level, with an unobstructed view from the sidewalk of the anterooms, and rooms adjoining the place where said tables are kept, and which are operated in connection with said place of business are hereby prohibited.
 All places in the Village of Clarkston where any billiard table, pool table, or pocket billiard table or table are kept, operated or maintained within the meaning of this ordinance, shall be closed from 12 o'clock midnight until 7 o'clock A. M. Eastern standard time, on each day of the week, except that it will remain closed on Sundays and all tables, pool tables, pool billiards or pocket billiards, under this ordinance, must be covered.
 It is not the intent of this ordinance to prohibit the sale of non-alcoholic beverages, known as soft drinks, refreshments, or both, on Sundays, when the billiard or pool billiard tables or table will be covered and not open for play, to the public or private members. However, all provisions of this ordinance must be fully and strictly observed in reference to complete observance of the terms under which license has been issued.
 Section 7 Any person, firm or corporation who shall twice be convicted of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall thereupon in addition to all other penalties herein provided forfeit any license granted in the provisions hereof and shall thereupon become and be disqualified from thereafter holding a license under this ordinance, and in this Village of Clarkston.
 Section 8 Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall upon conviction in addition to all other penalties provided herein, be subjected to a fine of not to exceed \$100.00 or to imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.
 Section 9 All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
 Section 10 This ordinance shall take effect July 1st, 1946.

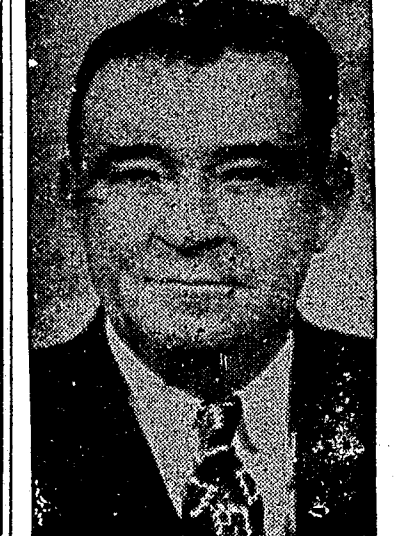
