The Meaning of Christmas

Dr. William S. Ross

The Christmas message is found in Luke 2:10-14. And the angel said unto them, Fear not; for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men in whom He is well

pleased". At this time of year imagination turns itself back to Bethlehem and the nativity. Here is the strangest scene upon whch men and angels ever gazed. The cradle of the stable held Deity. The Ancient of Days became a babe in arms. From the womb of a virgin peasant He came to find a busy and indifferent world.

To many Christmas is a time of anxiety about buying suitable gifts. The tinsel, shopping, exchange of gfts and the carol singing may be superficial. If we would observe Christmas as it should be observed, let us become possessed of the Spirit of the Lord Jesus Christ and reproduce Him in our daily conduct.

To God the Father, Christmas meant the giving of His Son. The word "BEHOLD" draws our attention to the greatest expression of divine love toward man. "God so loved the world that He gave His Only Begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life". Paul said, "But God commendeth His love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us". The Lord Jesus Christ is the embodiment of God's love. His presence is made real to you when His "perfect love casteth out all

fear" To God the Son, Christmas meant becoming the Saviour of men. "Fear not; for unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord". These words were spoken by the angel to the shepherds. At that time He was born in a manger at g Bethlehem. That was a happy day. It is also a happy day when He is born into our lives.

To God the Holy Spirit, Christmas meant the launching of a great mission. "I bring you good tidings of great joy, whch shall be to all people". God showed His love and mercy before men sought for it. Man did not send up to the door of Heaven to bring God down. God came down to bring man up to His level. Paul wrote, "that we who were afar off are made nigh by the blood of Christ". Man could not grope his way back into fellowship with God and so God came nigh to man in Christ. It is written "God is a very present help in time of trouble". Our Lord promised, "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the age". That is the message which the Holy Spirit annoints men and women to preach to all men everywhere.

To the believing Christian, Christmas means "tidings of great joy". Christmas hails the birth of Him who was born to die—to die in the sinners stead, to purchase the redemption of his soul. For "all we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way. and the Lord hath laid upon Him the iniquity of us all". He not only died for our sins but He was raised for our justification. Our fellowship with the risen Christ is described by F. A. Blackmer in the words of the hymn:

"Once I thought I walked with Jesus Yet such changeful feelings had. Sometimes trusting, sometimes doubting, Sometimes joyful, sometimes sad. Oh, the peace the Saviour gives! Peace I never knew before And the way has brighter grown Since I learned to trust Him more".

The Christmas spirit is expressed in the words, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men in whom He is well pleased". The God of peace is reigning in the lives of all "in whom He is well pleased" So "The peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus" The Lord Jesus said, "My peace I give unto you, not as the world giveth, give I unto you".

Dr. A. B. Simpson wrote of Him:

"Once it was the blessing, now it is the Lord; Once it was the feeling, now it is His Word; Once His gift I wanted, now the Giver own; Once I sought for healing, now Himself alone. All in all forever, Jesus will I sing; Everything in Jesus, and Jesus, everything".
