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

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Record Bear Kill In 1946 Game Hunt

Besides bringing home a record harvest of deer, Michigan's 1946 big game hunters also bagged a record number of bears, if game-kill card returns show hunters' luck below the Straits was as good as that in the upper peninsula. Last year, when the conservation department's game division estimated the kill at just over 1,000 bears (546 of them in the upper peninsula) the number brought across the Straits was 177. This season the Straits count was the highest on record—314 bears. Previous high count at the Straits was in 1940, when 243 were brought over. The number of bears deer hunt-

ers have taken across on the Straits ferries fluctuates widely. In some years the weather favors Bruin, as the count of 85 in 1943, 56 in 1933, and 69 in 1936 illustrates.

You Can Make Soap In Your Own Home

Do you have some left-over kitchen fat, not suitable for cooking, that you want to make into soap?

Mary J. E. Woodward, county home demonstration agent, advises amateur soap-makers to start with a small batch. One cup of clean waste fat will make one bar of soap. You will also need 5 teaspoons of lye, ½ cup soft water and 1 teaspoon borax per bar.

You can use waste fat from cooking, fat rendered from tallow, or hardened vegetable shortenings. It is best to use a combination of hard and soft fat. Soft fat alone makes soft, spongy soap.

To clarify the fat, melt it slowly and strain through two layers of cheesecloth. Add an equal volume of hot water, stir well and bring to a boil. Remove from the stove and add a quart of cold water, stirring constantly. Cool and remove the clean, firm fat on top.

To make the soap, first measure the fat. Heat until melted and cool to about 110 degrees. Stir the borax and stir mixture occasionally to prevent crystals forming as it cools.

Use enamel, iron or earthenware containers for dissolving the lye and mixing the soap. Stir with a wooden or enamel spoon. Use no aluminum equipment.

Dissolve the lye in water and cool to about 85 degrees. Pour the lye solution into the fat slowly and stir slowly but constantly for about 10 or 20 minutes.

The soap should then be about as thick as honey. If it is lumpy, it may be too cool. Set in a pan of warm water. Stir. If it is not thick in half an hour, it may be too warm. Set in cool water and stir.

Pour the soap into molds lined with waxed paper. Cover and keep warm for at least 24 hours. Then cut bars and allow to stand for two weeks in a dry place before using.

Tractor Accidents Can Be Avoided

A few simple precautions may save a "simple" accident with a tractor that will put you in the hospital or grave.

Karl D. Bailey, county agricultural agent, agrees that tractors are not so extensively used in the winter as in the summer, but points out that accident hazards are even greater.

Wintertime operations of tractors calls for extra care to prevent serious injuries.

Tractor engines should not be "warmed up" in the building. Carbon monoxide cannot be detected by odor. If you have to start the tractor indoors, open windows or doors for plenty of ventilation.

Use sand or ashes on icy ground to get a firm footing for climbing. And be certain the tractor is out of gear.

Keep ice and snow cleaned off the platforms, stepping places and the clutch.

Wear safe clothing—sturdy hat, jackets rather than long overcoats. Keep your seat tucked in and wear gloves or mittens with non-slip palms.

Don't retuel without stopping the engine.

"Most farmers know the proper precautions they should take. All they need to do to prevent winter tractor accidents is to think before they act," the agricultural adviser stated.
