Graydon Blank, MSC extension specialist in animal husbandry, states that all calves entered in the contest must be sired by registered beef bull and must have been born on or after September 1, 1946 and on or before April 1, 1947.

In February 1948 a show will be be eligible for this show and sale the calves must make an average gain of two pounds per day during ing period. They must weigh at project. Two calves may be entered per farm.

Last year's highest rate of gain was shown by a shorthorn steer fed and exhibited by Don Koephgen of Cass City. This calf was on feed for 225 days and gained 662 pounds for an average daily gain of 2.942 pounds. He required 3,810 pounds of grain and 990 pounds of hay to make the gain.

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Suggestions Made For Potato Care

Most of Michigan's 300-bushel per-acre potato growers carried on an intensive spray program throughout the season in 1946 Karl D. Bailey, county agricultural agent, said that while frequency of application varies with the weather conditions and insects. tests show that applications every

10 days or oftener are advisable. Throughout the past two years J. H. Muncie and W. F. Morofsky, Michigan State college botany and entolnology research specialists, have conducted experiments on spraying and dusting. The Lake City experiment station of the college used 25 different sprays and 16 different dusts.

They found that high or low lime bordeaux mixture plus DDT gave the best control of the Colorado potato beetle, flea beetle; potato leaf hopper, and six spotted leaf hopper. Of the fungicides used in sprays, Dithane plus zinc sulphate, lime and Bordow F-48 gave yields better than other ma-

In the dust plots, no outstanding differences were recorded among the 16 materials tested.

The county agent said their findings showed one good spray mixture tested consisted of one and one-half pounds of 50 percent wettable DDT combined with 8 pounds of copper sulfate, 4 pounds of hydrated lime and 100 gallons of water.

For dusting, three percent DDT in a 7 percent copper dust should give good results.

Last year the state winner could compete for only a national award, which was a Chicago trip. The trip is now a sectional award, and the winner receives the national award of a scholarship. County and State awards remain the same as in 1946.

In this activity, club members learn the foods best adapted to freezing, and to develope skill in preparing, packageing and freezing. They are also encouraged to demonstrate that an ample supply of home-grown food is one of the advantages of living on a farm, and to show the desirable variety that frozen foods can add to the

No Permit Needed To Kill Oppossums

If you want to kill off opossums nanging around your garden or The Michigan Rural Safety hen-house, it is quite all right to council, formed recently at Mich. I do so, and no conservation department permit is needed for this.

Many questionnaires used in intensive fox surveys this spring came back with recommendations for removal of protection from oppossums, revealing that many do not know the 'possum has been as unprotected as a crow or coyote since 1945. The primitive, slow moving animals are not regarded as a threat to game, but neither do they have any virtues to make them desirable in Michigan, according to conservation department game men.

Investigation Shows 2082. High Water Levels

Two months of heavy rains have o completely reversed the groundwater outlook in northern lower Michigan that instead of the early prospect of low inland lake levels, thehe now is prospect of satisfactory or abnormally high lake levels.

Readings at 42 shallow ground water wells in the Au Sable, Muskegon and Manistee river drainages are maintained by the conservation department's geolo-gical survey. Their figures for May averaged just one-hundredth of a foot under the highest May level in 10 years of record, and the only rise of record comparable to the 2.40 foot gain in the last two months is the rise of 2.41 feet in the nine months between September, 1942 and June. 1943.
