



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

Protect Milk

Milk losses brought about by condemnation of warm milk will be extremely high unless producers start immediately cooling all milk at the farm and protecting it in transportation.

Plant checks made by the Department of Agriculture inspectors last week found that considerable milk was arriving at the plants at 75 degrees or above. The state law and all city ordinances require that milk be cooled to 60 degrees, and all plants have been warned not to receive warm

According to F. M. Skiver, Chief Department of Agriculture, inspectors will continue to check temperatures at the plants as proper cooling of milk and cream is one of the most important factors in quality work. All milk producers should immediately check

Farmers who intend to plant alfalfa should be making plans now, advises Dr. S. T. Dexter, Michigan State college farm crops specialist.

Fleshy Calves Need Grain

Fleshy calves make more profitable gains if started on grain by mid-summer while thinner cattle continue to use pasture effectively until early September.

These and other findings have been reported by the Michigan State college Experiment Station as a result of identical experiments of the Bureau of Dairying, State carried on for two years by George A. Branaman and Carter Harrison, animal husbandry and farm crops specialists.

The project, conducted to determine the maximum use of roughage and pasture by steers, showed that lightly wintered calves, grazed three months on pasture without grain and fed for four months before marketing made the most profitable gains. In the wintering phase of the experiment, which was from December 27, 1945 to June 4, 1946, four different rations were fed. Most profitable was the lot fed corn silage with soybeans meal and a limited ration of approximately one pound per head per day. 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

Quackgrass may meet its doom in horticulture at Michigan State college. His experiements were reported in a recent issue of the Quarterly Bulletin of the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station.
