HAVE NURSERY STOCK INSPECTED BEFORE MOVING

This season of the year finds many people interested in moving plant materials. Too often this is done without the provisions of the law having been complied with, reports C. A. Boyer, Chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry, State Department of Agriculture.

It should be remembered that it is unlawful to move or transport any nursery stock from any premises until such stock has been officially inspected and a certificate issued by the Department Clarkston team. Bob Trim bolted of Agriculture indicating apparent freedom from serious insects and contagious plant diseases.

"Nursery stock" includes all trees, shrubs, vines and plants, either nursery grown or wild, cuttings, grafts, scions, buds, fruit pits and hardy herbaceous domestic perennials, peonies, iris, narcissus bulbs and roots, as well as other plants and plant products for, or capable of, propagation excepting field, vegetable and flower seeds, bedding plants corms and tubers.

> INSPECT STORED GRAIN FOR DAMAGE BY INSECTS

Bran bugs and weevils are big enemies of grain stored in granaries, points out county agricultural agent, Karl D. Bailey. He urges farmers to inspect their stored grain regularly from now on for evidence of damage by these insects.

Heated grain is a good indication that these pests are at work Bran bugs and weevils can cause grain to heat enough to cause great damage in addition to the injury done by their feeding. Warm weather during the fall is very favorable for grain insects.

Fumigation is the best means of getting rid of bran bugs and weevils once they infest the grain. Ray L. Jones, extension entomologist at Michigan State college advises that careful attention must be paid to the conditions under which fumigation is done. Use only perfect ripe tomatoes. To loosen skins, dip into boiling water for about half a minute then dip in cold water. Cut out tem ends and peel tomatoes.

For canning tomatoes with the not pack method, quarter the peeled tomatoes. Bring them to a boil stirring often. Pack hot in glass jars to one-half inch from the top. 
