Many Attend P. C. A. Meeting

210 in attendance at Howell, Pontiac, and Lapeer Sessions.

The annual meeting of the Pontiac Production Credit Association, held Tuesday, Dec. 2, in Howell, Wednesday, Dec. 3, in Pontiac, and Thursday, Dec. 4, in Lapeer, was attended by 210 persons.

Progress of the organization during the past fourteen years was illustrated with a chart, and comments on the chart were made by Harry Green of Washington, in delivering the report of the Directors. Most significant feature of his report was the substantial amount of reserves that has been built up, and it was emphasized that outstanding progress has been made in membership, reserves and ownership of stock.

In 1946 the total loaned was \$577,000, and during the first eleven months of this year the loans have reached \$618,000.

Fred J. Beckman, secretary-treasurer, also used charts to show the financial condition of the association as of September 30, 1947. A summary of the year's income and expenses reflected the best year in the association's history so far as net earnings were concerned. It was pointed out that the co-operative show has 825 members and that the member owned stock and reserves total over \$100,000 and the loans outstanding November 30, were \$454,000.

Albert Luchtmann of Washington was re-elected director for a term of three years.

Rev. Harold Pailthorpe, pastor of the Methodist Church, led the community singing at the Howell meeting. The entertainment at Pontiac other than the community singing led by Harry Bond, consisted of a saxophone solo by Miss Wheeler, several readings by Walter Cook, and Mr. Bond sang several special numbers. Mr. Beauchamp led the singing in Lapeer accompanied by Mrs. Robert Fisher and Mr. Hershberger entertained with several readings.

County AAA Mails Ballots

Official ballots to be used in the election of AAA Community Committeemen are being mailed to eligible farmer-voters in Oakland County, according to Walter E. Cook, Chairman of the Oakland County AAA Committee.

Farmers will then have until Dec. 24 in which to mark their ballots according to their choice and return the ballots, either by mail or in-person, to the County AAA office, 320 Hubbard Bldg., Pontiac, Mich.

An impartial election board of three members has been selected by the County AAA Committee to supervise the counting of the ballots on Dec. 26. Mr. Cook said. This board will be composed of the following members who have volunteered their services in the public interest: Fred Beckman, secretary-treasurer, Pontiac Production Credit Association, Pontiac, Mich.; Harry Garding, secretary-treasurer, Monitor Insurance Co., Pontiac, Mich. and S. C. Chamberlain, retired farmer, 69 Lincoln Ave., Pontiac, Mich.

Names of nominees for the following officers will be placed on the ballot to be mailed to each eligible farmer; chairman of committee; vice chairman of committee; third member of committee; alternate to committee; alternate to county committee; delegate to county committee election convention and alternate delegate to county committee election convention.

The county AAA election convention will be held in Pontiac on Dec. 30 for the purpose of electing a county AAA Committee to serve during 1948.

Approximately 1200 farmers in Oakland County are eligible to vote in the election. Mr. Cook said. An eligible farmer is one who is participating in the 1947 agricultural conservation program or the sugar program, or one who has a contract with the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. This included owners, operators or tenants on the eligible farms.

ORDER SEEDS NOW FARMERS ADVISED
With uneven supplies of grain and grass seeds in Michigan, farmers are advised to determine their needs and place their orders as soon as possible.
Supplies of Michigan-grown alfalfa and sweet clover seed are about normal, but due to spotty production, local shortages may develop.
Michigan State college specialists point out that red clover seed production in Michigan in 1947 was only half as large as in 1946 and down about 30 percent over the entire nation.

PREDICT FEWER PIGS IN 1948
A smaller hog crop in 1948 than in 1947 seems likely, believes Don Stark, Michigan State college agricultural economist, commenting on next year's farm outlook. Short grain supplies and high prices for grain are likely to keep some farmers from greater pork production.

The specialist advises that hogs now on Michigan farms be finished out. Soft corn or off-grade wheat may be used for this purpose. Marketing at weights around 200 pounds makes more efficient use of grain, but may lower the total production of pork and lard.
Old sows can be disposed of while prices are high and replaced with gilts to farrow next spring. The spring pig crop can then be carried through the summer on good legume pasture and finished after the 1948 small grain crop is harvested. Feeding specialists say a greater use of protein supplement will decrease the amount of grain needed to feed pigs.
