> D. E. Karn, Vice president and general manager of Consumers, said the company planned to install mobile telephone equipment in electric and gas construction trucks and service cars.

"This will speed up repairs in storms and other emergencies", he said. "It also will enable us to respond to all kinds of trouble calls with minimum delay".

Applications for construction permits for the stations of the mobile system will be submitted to the FCC a few at a time, be ginning this month and continuing as equipment becomes available and as work progresses.

Each vehicle will be equipped with a loud-speaker for verbal signalling from the land station near which it is operating, a telephone handset with which to carry on conversations, a radio receiving unit, and a 30-watt transmitter.

#### G. I. INSURANCE HAS

The Veterans Administration has issued new G. I. insurance regulations which in effect will keep term insurance intact for those veterans who in good faith have been paying their monthly at one time or another been in- From too much food their owners formed that one or more payments

are missing. These new insurance regulations mean that the Veterans Administration is forgiving these lost or missing premiums, and mean that If authorized, the system will missing premiums, and mean that the built during a two-year period the veteran's insurance remains in within the purview of Technical Bulletin 9-53.

These regulations apply only to veterans who have made premium payments on time for the months of July and August, 1947, and for all months after July and August. Futhermore, the forgiveness clause applies only to term, and not to converted insurance policies, Paragraph 2 of Technical Bulletin 9-53 s as follows:

"Where there are missing term insurance premiums for one or Fri.-Sat. more months prior to July, 1947, and provided the premiums for July and August, 1947, have been timely paid, insurance, if otherwise in order, will be deemed in force and will continue in force for only so long as the premiums thereafter becoming due are timely paid as provided in existing regulations. For brine William Davidson who is with cure, these ingredients can be for each 100 pounds of meat.

Figure the curiug time follows: Two and one-half to three days per pound per piece for hams and shoulders and two days per pound per piece for bacons. If using the dry cure, rub one-half the curing mixture on all surfaces of the meat, using a heavier layer on the thicker cuts. Pack the cuts in a clean wooden barrel or crock, being careful not to shake off the curing mixture. After six to eight days, take the meat out of the cure and resalt the hams and shoulders with the emainder of the curing mixture
