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## C. H. S. Tightens First Place Grip

With the improving Wolves hitting 50 points for the first time this season, Clarkston increased its lead to 2 full games in the Twin County Circuit. After leading 14-9 at the end of the first quarter, the home town five had little trouble in downing Detroit Country Day School 51-35.

Donald Dubats dropped the first goal to give the Wolves the lead which they never relinquished throughout the game. Adams, and Dubats paced the Junior team that started the game, with 9 points between them, to give Clarkston their 5 point first period lead.

Chuck McGee looped 2 dog shots at the offset of the second quarter while the highpoint man of the evening, Shaw of Country Day was sinking 2 free throws. McGee had another goal along with Longair and Anderson, as Ludwig and Greathouse were adding free tosses to accomplish the 29-15 half time lead.

The second half was somewhat slower, and as the final whistle blew, ending the game, Gene Greathouse' breakaway shot cleared the rim marking 51 points for the fifth straight league win.

It was the ninth consecutive victory of the season, and leaves Clarkston the only undefeated Oakland County School. It looks as if Clarkston has a good team this year, so let's get some town spirit behind them and see them play. Tonight the Wolves tackle Big Beaver at Country Day School.

After leading throughout the game, Clarkston's Wolves met their first master of the season Tuesday night. With slightly more than a minute left, Milford's Schuman sank two goals to put the Redskins ahead for the first time since the opening minutes, to give them a hard-fought 39-38 victory.

Clarkston had its usual slow start, and was trailing 6-3 midway through the initial period. Dean Anderson and Chuck McGee began hitting, and soon the score stood 9-6, Clarkston. Free throws by Ludwig and Witt of Milford made the score 10-7 at the end of the quarter.

Dubats of the Wolves and Brophy of Milford staged a scoring duel in the second period with each getting six points, while the half time total was being raised to 24-20, still in Clarkston's favor. Adams, Greathouse, and Wells notched markers for C. H. S., with Schuman and Witt helping Brophy for the Redskins.

Milford came one point closer in the third stanza, outscoring Clarkston 7-5, as free throws made the difference. Each team had 2 field goals, but the boys in white dropped 3 free tosses to 2 for Clarkston. Adams had 3 points for the Wolves in that period.

The beginning of the last quarter was even, but near the automatic timeout, Clarkston pulled away to a 38-33 lead. With less than 2 minutes left Brophy started the scoring spree for Milford to up the Redskin total to 35. In 2 fast break-aways Schuman looped the clinchers, the last one luckily dropping through from deep in the corner. The score was 39-38 in Milford's favor and that's how the game ended as Clarkston had no scoring chance. The little Wolves were scrounged 48-12 by Milford reserves.

## Day of Prayer Friday, Feb. 13

The local World Day of Prayer Committee acting under the supervision of the Michigan Council of Church Women and the United Council of Church Women will hold the Annual World Day of Prayer in the Methodist Church next Friday, February 13th, at two o'clock. This meeting, as every other such gathering, is interdenominational, international, and interracial.

Mrs. Arthur D. Klontz of Flint Michigan will be the guest speaker. The program which will begin at one o'clock with a luncheon is open to all women of the community. Each person is asked to bring her own sandwiches. Dessert and tea and coffee will be furnished by the committee. Following the one o'clock luncheon and promptly at two o'clock the program will begin. The offering will be divided among four missionary projects, all of them interdenominational, the colleges for women in the Orient; Christian literature for women and children in the Orient; work among the migrants in the United States. No part of the offering is used for expense or operating, every cent goes directly to the projects above for their work. All expenses incurred are met out of private funds given for this cause.

Last year there were more than 10,000 observances of the World Day of Prayer reported in the United States and the offering was nearly \$200,000. This day is observed in more than fifty countries of the world.

It is hoped that the women of Clarkston will join with the many thousands of women in the world to make this a great day in behalf of prayer and world unity.

### COMMISSIONS NOW OPEN

A policy of direct appointment of second lieutenants to the National Guard of qualified former enlisted men of all grades has been announced by Major General Kenneth F. Cramer, chief of National Guard Bureau.

Former enlisted men having a minimum of six months of service in the Army of the United States between December 7, 1941 and June 30, 1947 are now eligible for direct appointment as second lieutenants in the National Guard if they meet the following requirements:

1. They are graduates of an accredited college or University where no advance Reserve Officers Training Course was given or, if it was given their period in school before graduation was too short to permit them to complete the ROTC course.

2. They are 21 years old and have not passed their 28th birthday at the time of appointment in the Guard.

Commissions as second lieutenant in the National Guard are also open to advance ROTC graduates without previous military service.

Hitherto, direct appointments were limited to eligible warrant officers and enlisted men of the first three pay grades.

Interested veterans should inquire at any Army or write to the Adjutant General's Office, Capitol Savings and Loan Building, Lansing, Michigan.

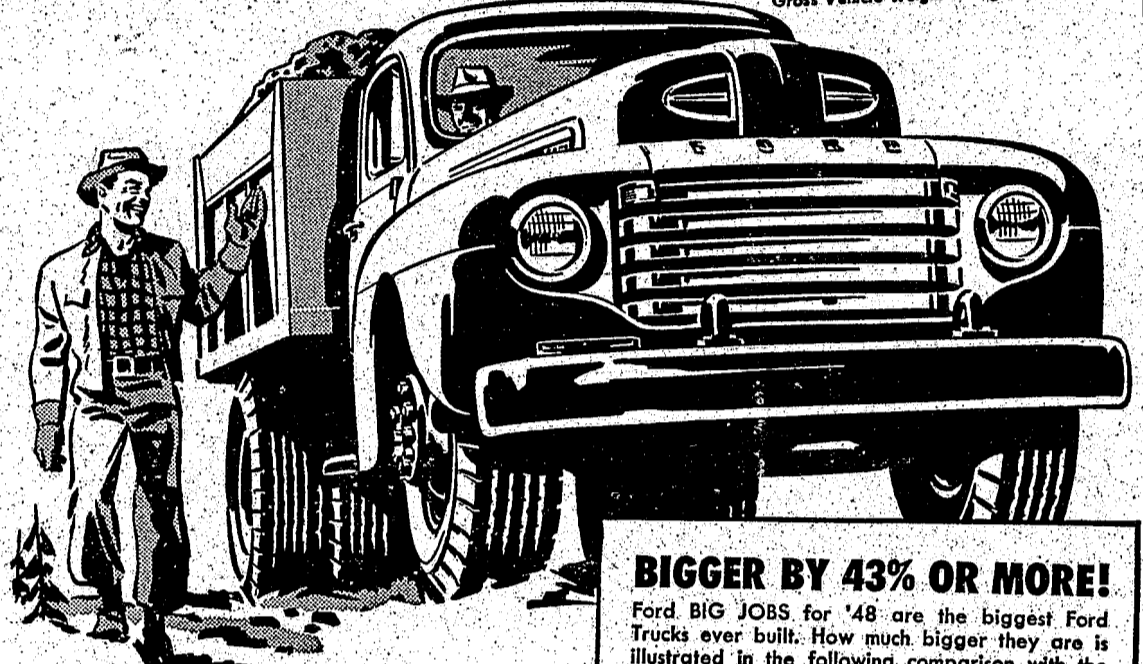
