## WALNUT SEEDS AVAILABLE FROM M. S. C. FORESTERS

Stratified walnut seeds to keep American walnut a continuing crop throughout the state are available from the Michigan State college forestry department, according to Ira Bull MSC forester. The forestry specialist points out that because no other native hardwood yields a crop as necessary and so valuable to the farmer and woodland owner, American walnut is an important asset to this area. The tree is also sometimes called "black" walnut. Just as Johnny Appleseed is credited with making mid-western orchards an asset, the past generation assured Americans of walnut for both gunstocks and cabinetwork purposes. Both World Wars used large stocks of walnut, yet there is an ample supply remaining for domestic uses if only mature trees are harvested, and if a continuing planting program is kept up.

Timberland owners who wish to plant walnuts are urged to place orders immediately. Orders should be placed in forestry tree seedling order blanks which are available from county agricultural agents or from the Forestry Department, Michigan State college, East Lansing.

Nut planting is cheaper than seedlings and the results better, Bull reports. It is not too late to order these now for spring will soon be here. Planting can be started as soon as the frost leaves the ground.

Complete planting instructions will accompany each shipment of walnuts. "Growing Walnut for Profit", a publication prepared by the American Walnut Manufacturers association, is also available free of cost by writing to the MSC forestry department at East Lansing.

## BALANCE MEALS WHEN YOU BALANCE BUDGET

When you cut down the amount of meat you serve your family in order to balance your food budget don't forget to balance your meals with enough of the right substitutes.

There are some foods which contain fairly large amounts of most of the essentials we get from meat advises Anne Louise Kelly, instructor in nutrition research at Michigan State college.

Meat, fish, milk and eggs usually serve as the main sources of protein in our diet as well as sources of minerals and vitamins. Choosing foods that will make up equally for the loss of animal foods is

difficult.

Of the plant foods one of the more important substitutes is dry beans. Dry beans is a good source of calcium, iron, phosphorus, copper, manganese and several of the "B" vitamins. They also contain

some of Vitamins A and E, liberal amounts of carbohydrates, some fat and more protein than any other vegetable.

How you cook these beans is very important to the food value you get from them and also in

making them more easily digested. They should be cooked a long time in moist slow heat. When you use them as a meat substitute add small amounts of lean meat in order to supply your family with enough protein.

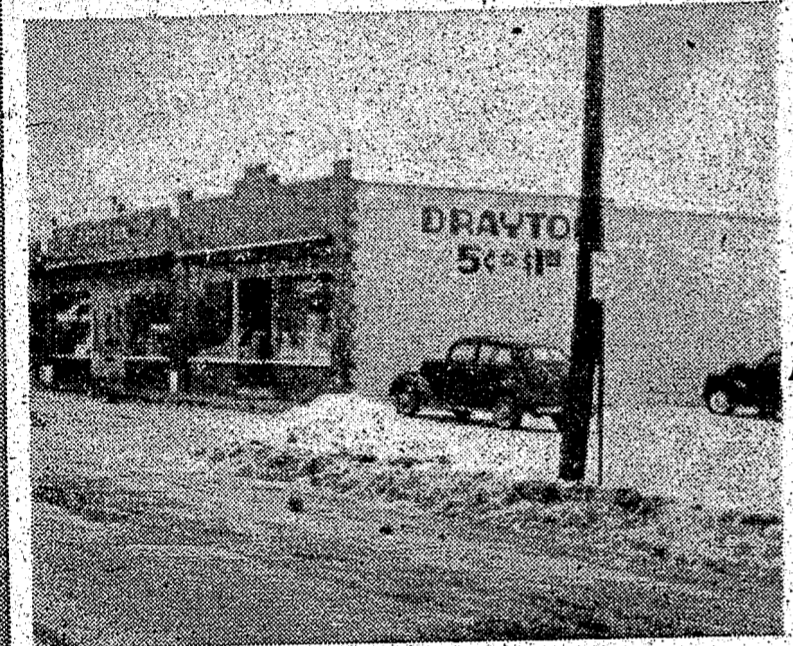

N. L. Partridge and J. O. Veatch of the Michigan State college departments of horticulture and soil science. Soil, topography and climate, as well as local market, are of

great importance in the selection of an orchard site, the specialists declare.

In general, well-drained loamy soils, underlain by till clay of relatively open structures, such as those located within three or four miles of Lake Michigan, are also good. Other sites might safely be chosen where only one of the factors is slightly less than satisfactory.

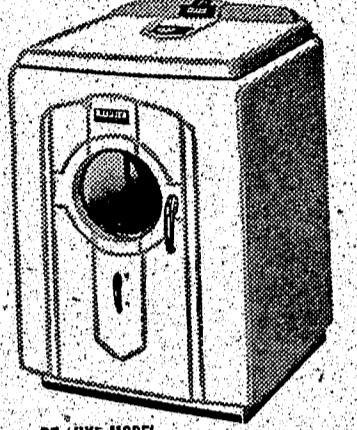
