A new approach to the Atom Bomb problem will be presented when the sound-color film "God of the Atom" is shown at 7:30 p. m., Thursday (March 4) at the be interested in the winners of ident of the Michigan Society for First Baptist Church, according to a tournament at Howe's Lanes. Crippled Children and Adults, Inc. the Rev. William S. Ross D. D., pastor of the church.

The picture has been produced by Dr. Irwin A. Moon, director of Moody Institute of Science in Los Angeles, and noted originator of "Sermons from Science". In the film, actual shots of the Nagasaki giant 184 inch cyclotron at the University of California. Since concrete walls have been built around the cyclotron, and the interior has been rendered dangerously radioactive.

In his role as narrator of "God of the Atom", Dr. Moon declares, 'Our trouble in the world has never been due to the fact that we've had swords, or guns, or gunpowder, or tanks, or airplanes, or even atomic bombs. Take all these things from the world and men will beat each other to death with their bare fists". The problem is not what man has, but what man is, he says.

Larry Johnston, a young physicist who aided in atomic development at Los Alamos and photographed all three wartime bombs as they exploded, also appears in the film with an eyewitness account of his experien-"God of the Atom" is second in



CHECK EQUIPMENT FOR MAPLE SYRUP TIME

Get your maple syrup equipment ready. That's the advice of Ira Bull, forestry specialist at Michigan State college.

Early runs of sap, which come when the weather warms, are worth collecting. Waiting until the mild weather to wash out equipment may mean that the first run is over before you can get the pails .out.

An adequate supply of cans or glass containers and labels should be purchased. Felt filters should be examined to see that there are no holes in them.

The forester also advises that thermometers be tested in boiling water to see if it reaches 212 or 211 degrees. The boiling point of water will decrease approximately one degree with every 500 feet above sea level. If you use a hydrometer, see that it is in good

An adequate wood supply is ilso a necessary part of syrup making. There is little time to cut fuel when the sap finally begins to flow.
