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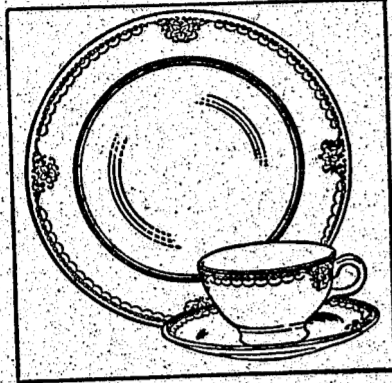

her home with flu. The attendance at the Community Sunday School the past two Sundays was 200 and 208.

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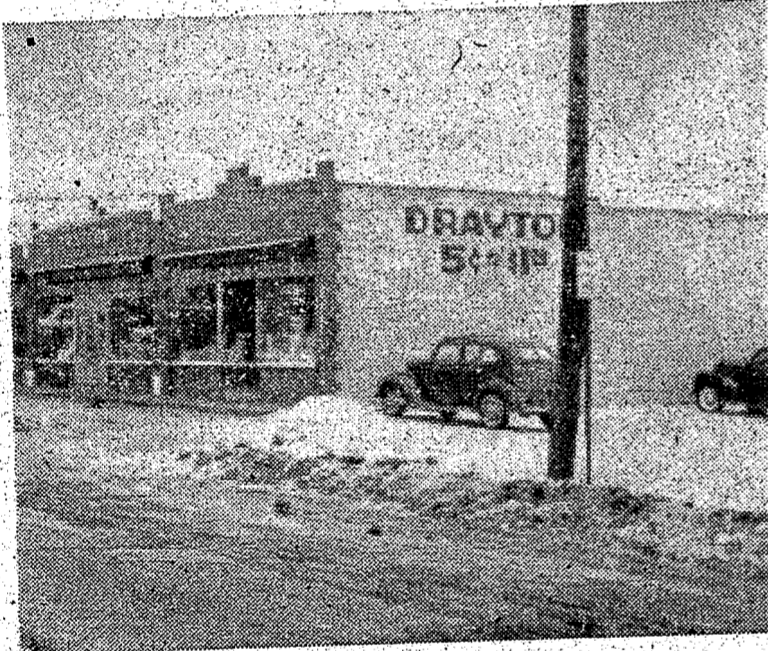

TROUT FISHERMEN

Mailing of the 1948 issue of the trout stamp has begun and will continue through this week, so all the state's 3,200 fishing license dealers may have them on hand by March 15.

Trout fishermen, who will need the stamps for the season that begins this year on April 24, are advised by the conservation department that to be valid, the stamp must be fastened to the general rod license. It is suggested that they stick it to the back of the license.

The stamps will sell for \$1.00 each, and the income will be used for the propagation and planting of trout in trout streams. Collectors have shown an interest in this first issue, believed the first printed by any state to license fishermen.
