

"It shoud be remembered that regulated public utilities are not permitted to accumulate large surpluses. A large part of the money for this expansion must be borrowed and interest paid on it, or, secured through the sale of stock, on which dividends must be paid. Adequate carnings are essential to attract investors. Most of the things Detroit Edison buys today have increased in price, just as they have for every other business and householder. In the past 10 years our coal cost has gone up 88 percent, labor has gone up 58 percent, and supplies such as poles, copper, cable, gasoline and transformers have increase stantially.


