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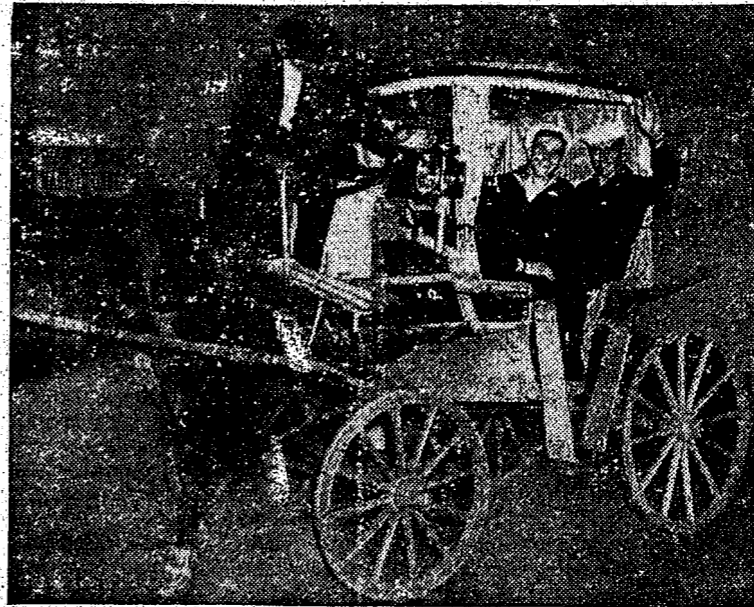

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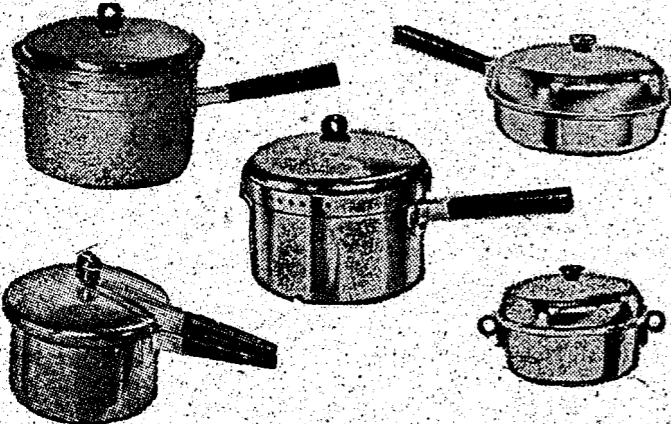

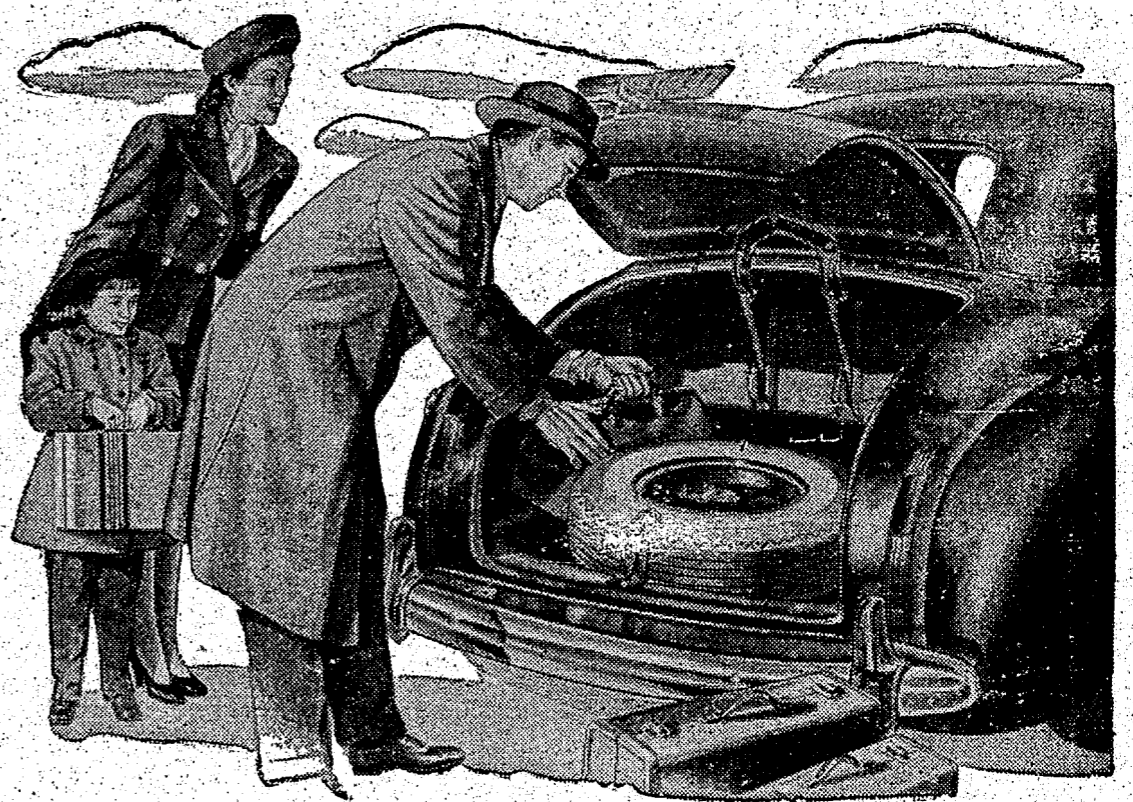

**GMC DELIVERS LARGEST BUS ORDER**

Delivery was made this week of the first group of seventy additional "Siversides" buses for Great Lakes Greyhound Lines, according to R. W. Budd, President of the company in Detroit. This

order, representing approximately \$2,000,000.00, will be completed by June 1. It is one of the largest ever substitute a part of that order. This delivery, coupled with new "Siversides" and other models already received, will give the Great Lakes company one of the most modern bus fleets in the country.

It could not eliminate during the war. These present deliveries constitute a part of that order. The buses embody the latest ideas in safety and comfort, and have a capacity of 41 seated passengers. From the outside they are typically Greyhound, with fluted aluminum panels and blue and white trim. Inside, the windows have been made larger and equipped with heat resistant Solex glass.

The Diesel engines have increased to 212 horsepower to provide smooth and steeper road performances under all operating conditions. According to Budd, thirty "Siversides", of the forthcoming shipment, will join twenty new units already in service between Detroit and Bay City in order to furnish additional schedules as well as provide normal replacements. The remaining new units will be allocated to various operations in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky.

Several years ago Greyhound instituted a large replacement program in order to retire many buses

Michigan is one of the leading states in the production of fine nursery stock, the annual income derived there from exceeds \$36,000,000. **BUY INSECTICIDES NOW WHILE SUPPLY IS GOOD**

Early purchase of insecticides needed this year is advised by county agricultural agent Karl D. Bailey.

Reports from all parts of the nation say that farmers have been slow in determining their insecticide and fungicide needs. Many find it hard to make up their mind on what kind and how much they want. Others have delayed buying because they think the price of insecticides containing DDT may go down.

Economists say that although some declines have been noted prices are fairly steady now.

For the nation as a whole, the supply of nicotine insecticides is better than last year. However the supply still continues below

the demand and need. Enough pyrethrum is on hand. Rotenone insecticides are in good supply now but may run short during the latter part of the season.

Supplies of lead arsenate and calcium arsenate are probably sufficient to meet this year's needs. Good supplies are reported of the new insecticides such as DDT, chlordane, benzene hexachloride and chlorinated camphene as well as the newer fumigants and fungicides.

Lightning rods protect buildings, but only when the connections to the ground are good, advises MISC farm safety specialists.

One of the chief advantages of an artificial cattle breeding program is that superior sires are used. The result usually is better dairy cows and more profit.

A good fire extinguisher is a must in the kitchen and barn. One fire that gets out of hand can wipe out a farmer's life work in a few minutes.

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**ADVICE ON MOVEMENT OF NURSEY STOCK**

Since the planting season is here, the Michigan Department of Agriculture wishes to direct attention to the requirements of the law regarding movement of nursery stock in the state. Nursery stock is particularly defined as all trees, shrubs, vines and plants either nursery-grown or wild. According to state laws, it is unlawful to dispose of such nursery stock, states C. A. Boyer, Chief of the Bureau of Plant Nursery until it has been inspected by an official inspector of the department, and a certificate given indicating it is apparently free from disease and insects.

In purchasing nursery stock, the buyer should demand this certificate as his protection that the stock has been officially inspected and found to be apparently free from serious insect pest and contagious plant diseases.

In the case of bramble plants, as well as strawberries, two inspections are required during the growing season. Unless strawberries and raspberries were inspected twice during the past summer season, such stock cannot be disposed of at this time, as it would be impossible for the two inspections to be conducted during the spring season.

**RURAL ZONING URGED BY M. S. C. SPECIALIST**

Zoning of rural communities, small towns and townships is termed as "insurance" by Dr. Louis A. Wolfanger, extension specialist in land use planning at Michigan State college.

"Most communities," Dr. Wolfanger contends, "do not concern themselves with what is taking place in the limits until some misuse of land takes place or an offensive industry, business or other activity appears. Then they seek to remedy the condition by zoning or the enactment of a building code or some similar measure. But it is then too late because no such measure can be retroactive."

The MSC extension specialist reports.

Through its extension and research facilities, Michigan State college has assisted many communities in zoning problems.

**COUNTY CHAIRMAN GIVES CLOSING DATE**

Farmers of Oakland County are reminded that the closing date for signing up in the 1948 Agricultural Conservation Program, is May 1st.

In this program the Nation through the government, cooperates with the farmers who operate the land in a program to conserve and protect the land so that it will keep on producing food and fiber.

By cooperating on the 1948 Agricultural Conservation Program each farmer will add his bit to the nation wide effort to conserve the Nation's most valuable natural resource - soil and water.

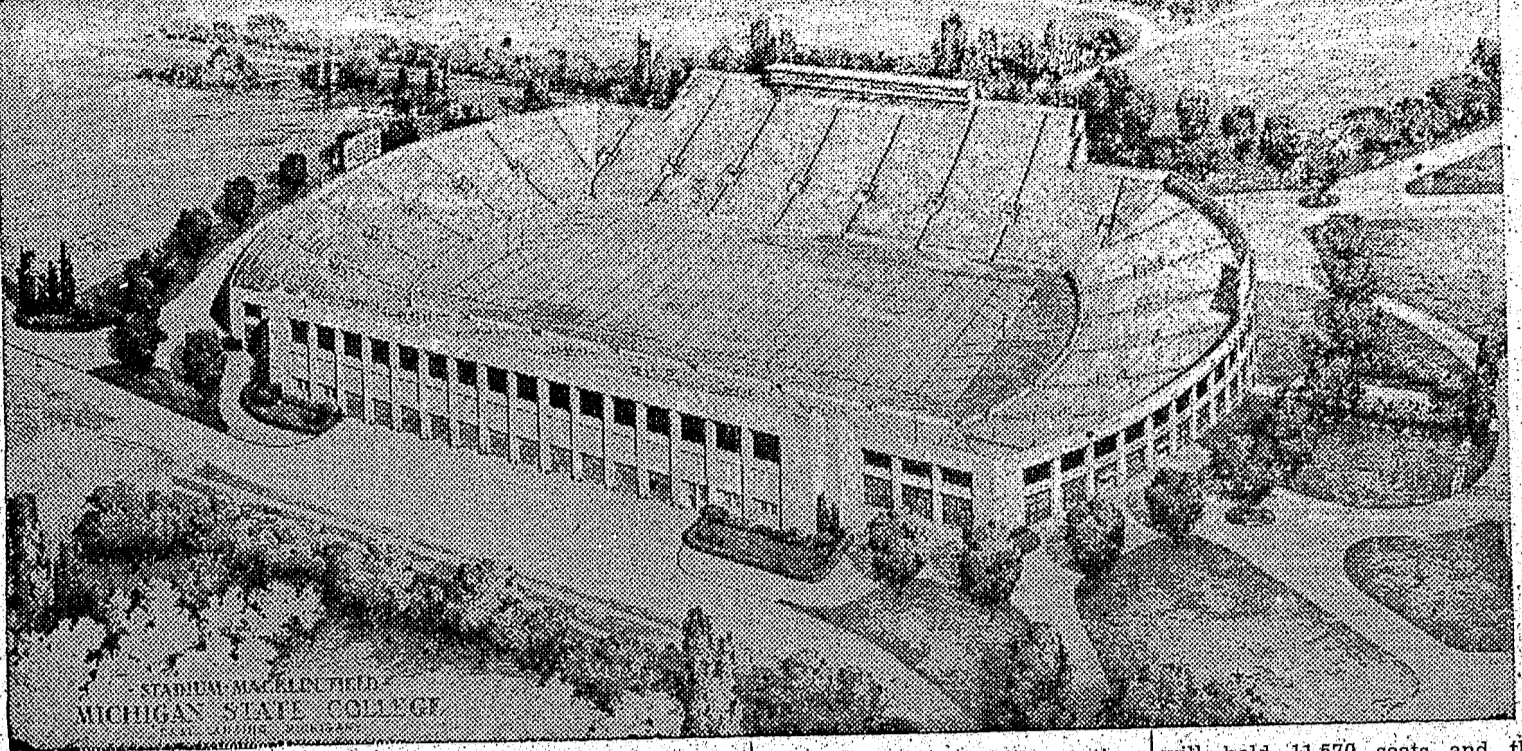

**PLANT FOOD SAVED BY PROPER METHODS**

Careful handling of farm manures can help to conserve the plant food contained by it, according to Michigan State college soil specialists.

Part of the plant food is lost in the form of gas into the air, even under the best management methods. Part is lost by leaching and run-off.

According to the specialists, one of the most wasteful methods of handling manure is to let it ac-



**NEW FOOTBALL STADIUM RISES AT MICHIGAN STATE**

well under way. The view is looking from the east to the west stands on which rises the double-decked press box. The bowl-like structure involves expanding the former Macklin field stadium of some 24,000 seats to a new ca-

capacity of 50,410. Sideline sections of the former stadium are being increased from 46 to 66 rows, with 13,777 seats on the east side and 13,126 on the west. The end zones, formerly of 11 rows, are being increased to 46. The north end

will hold 11,570 seats and the south end 11,666. The press box will seat 274 persons. Dedication of the new structure will take place September 25 with the 41st renewal of the Michigan-Michigan State football series.

**GRUB INJURY CUTS CATTLE HIDE VALUE**

Grub control before cattle hides are injured is urged by George Brananan, Michigan State college animal husbandry specialist.

Packers report that one out of every three hides are damaged by grubs. Torture of the cattle by grub flies in the summer causes slower gain in weight and lowered milk production.

According to the specialists the grub must be killed before it comes out through the hole in the hide. Rotone powder or wash worked into the grub holes on cattle's backs kill the grubs and they are absorbed or eliminated.

**FERTILIZER ADVICE GIVEN IN BULLETIN**

The annual bulletin of Michigan fertilizer recommendations, compiled by the Michigan State college soil science and horticulture departments, is now available.

The recommendations made are gathered from field experiments covering many years. Scientists conduct these experiments in different parts of the state under the same climatic conditions that farmers have for growing crops. Fertilizers are then suggested for various types of soil and for various crops.

**HARMONY BETWEEN RACES AND NATIONS SHOWN AT COLLEGE**

While statesmen searched frantically for the keys to world co-operation and peace, Michigan State College students last Saturday demonstrated the accomplished fact of harmony between races and nationalities.

The occasion was the fourth annual International Festival, believed to be the only event of its kind at any college or university in the land.

Approximately 100 foreign students from nearly two-score countries collaborated with some 50 American students in staging the festival. Featured were scenes, including dances, music and other activities, from a variety of countries.

"The festival," said George Vayonias, a greek student who is president of the sponsoring International Club, "was an attempt to show what some experiments in international living really mean. It was an attempt to promote international good will."

Stump The Driver

The average driver will flunk at least four of six important points about driving, traffic experts found after examining results in a countrywide drivers poll.

The tragedy of the poll is that failure to know any one of the answers can result in a fatal accident, possibly to you. Briefly, here are the four points most motorists missed — but should have known.

1. The fastest, safest way to stop a car: "Pump" the brake pedal, instead of slamming it down and holding it there.
2. How to control the car when a tire blows out: Grip the steering wheel hard, concentrate on keeping the car going straight ahead, keep your foot on the gas, — never, never slam on the brakes — slow down slowly.
3. The astonishing distances required to stop a car at various speeds: At 40 miles an hour, it takes 123-164 feet; at 50, from 186 to 243, and at 60, from 275 to 357 feet or more than a city block.
4. The right way to hold the steering wheel: The left hand should be at a place corresponding to 9 or 10 o'clock and the right hand at 2 or 3 o'clock for quickest action in an emergency.

## EDUCATOR SAYS U. S. HAS FAILED TO SELL DEMOCRACY ABROAD

The failure of the United States to get across her democratic message to the world was strongly criticized by Dr. John A. Hannah, president of Michigan State college, in an address before a Rotary International conference at Lansing recently.

Dr. Hannah intimated that this failure was responsible, at least in part, for Russian ascendancy in parts of Europe and Asia.

"In this period of world crisis most of the blind followers of the Russian creed do not know what it is we have here in America," he declared. "They know only what they have been told, and we have not been talking long enough, or fast enough, or loud enough, to drown out the strident accusations of the Bolshevik propaganda peddlers."

"Who is to blame", he asked, "if the peoples of the Balkans or Asia do not know that the secret of American success is to be found, not in natural resources, favorable climate, or native luck, but in the intangible substances of the spirit? How are they to know, unless we tell them the story?"

He asserted that there is "an enormous educational job to be done in the world. I hope that time remains to start at the beginning to teach people how to get along together in a peaceful world".

## SUMMER SCHOOL MUSIC COURSES TO BE OFFERED

Nineteen courses in music for high school students and music teachers will be offered in the third annual School Music Courses to be held at Michigan State College, East Lansing, June 28 to July 17.

The regular Michigan State music faculty will be augmented by 15 high school teachers and band directors from the state. Enrollment has been limited to 200 high school students, according to Prof. William R. Sur, director of the session.

Among the visiting teachers will be Bernard B. Stone, supervisor of music at the Mt. Pleasant Schools and assistant professor of music at Central Michigan College. He will be guest conductor of the Youth Choir.

Other visiting teachers will include Arnold Berndt, of Birmingham High School; Victor Iams, of Manistee; Bennhardt M. Kuschel, of Benton Harbor; Arthur M. Moe of Grand Ledge; Palmer Quackenbush, of Grand Haven, and Eldon Rosegart, of Leslie.

Aspiring high school musicians in grades 9 - 12 will have the opportunity to participate in the band, choir and orchestra, in addition to enrolling in any of the eight other courses offered them. The latter include music theory, music literature, small ensembles, conducting, baton twirling, radio broadcasting, individual instruction in vocal or instrumental music.

## MICHIGAN Motoring

### Nazis Were Pikers

When it comes to killing or maiming people, the Japs and the Nazis were "small fry" compared to American motorists.



During four years of World War II, we suffered some 950,000 casualties. In 1948, the first peacetime year, Americans were not being killed and wounded by foreign enemies, yet we injured each other to the extent of 1,200,000 accident casualties - a quarter of a million more in one year than the war did in nearly four years.

Unbelievable at first glance, but true. In 1947, it is estimated that 32,500 persons met death in automobile accidents in this country, in addition to another million injured. Coming closer to home, the Michigan State Police report that traffic killed 1,446, and injured 37,682 in 1947. This is an 11 per cent increase in injuries and a 25 per cent increase in accidents compared with 1946.

It's a strange psychology that causes Americans to demand an end to war abroad - but not to a traffic "war" that injures more friends and relatives in one year than alien enemies could do in four.

Shell color may affect egg price. Yet there is absolutely no advantage to the consumer in paying a premium for shell color. Sometimes white shell eggs are priced higher than brown eggs or than a mixture of brown and white. Michigan State college poultry specialists advise, however, that the "meat" of the eggs, inside the shell, is the same in food value and flavor because shell color depends on the breed of the hen.

**DRIVE AGAINST CROWS IS BEING STARTED**

A county-wide campaign against crows is being launched by the Oakland County Sportsmen's club. Destruction to pheasant eggs and small game by crows is increasing, game men say, and OCSC is planning a summer-long drive against the predators.

Suitable awards to climax next fall are being arranged by the OCSC anti-crow committee headed by Arthur Day. These awards will go to the OCSC members taking the most crows during the season. Details of the "crow contest" will be announced soon, Day said.
