Since the planting season is here, the Michigan Department of Agriculture wishes to direct the clubhouse decision and the attention to the requirements of Burghardt entertainment. the law regarding movement of jursery stock in the state. Nursery stock is partically defined as all trees, shrubs, vines and plants either nursery-grown or wild. According to state laws, it is unlawfull to dispose of such nursery stock, states C. A. 

Grub control before cattle hides ire injured is urged by George Branaman, Michigan State college animal husbandry specialist.

Packers report that one out of every three hides are damaged by grubs. Torture of the cattle by grub flies in the summer causes slower gain in weight and lowered milk production.

According to the specialists the grub must be killed before it comes out through the hole in the hide. Rotnone powder or wash worked into the grub holes on cattles' backs kill the grubs and they are absorbed or eliminated
