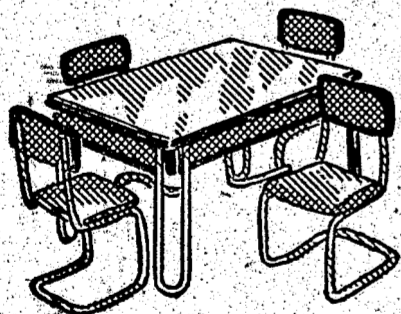

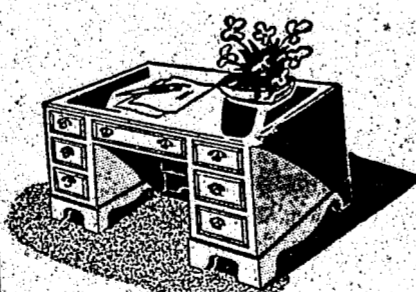

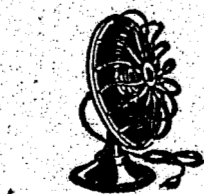

adopted a plan of using letter-type dial number plates on all dial telephones currently being installed throughout its territory. It is estimated that between 80 and 90 per cent of the company's million-and-a-half telephones will require the lettered number plates within the next few years. Exchanges in which they have been used in the past include Detroit and Grand Rapids. Installation for ultimate use is well underway at Flint and Pontiac.

The Michigan Public Service Commission authorized the establishment of extended area service in most of the company's exchanges in April.

The new service, which will permit telephone users in adjacent areas to call each other without toll charges, will not go into effect in the first exchange until sometime after the completion of the company's main rate case.

The letter-type dial plates are being made available for all new telephones and also for instruments moved to another address, or replaced for maintenance purposes.

**PROPOSITION NO. 1, to-wit:**  
Shall Section 22 of Chapter IX of the charter of the Village of Clarkston, Michigan (Same being Act No. 3, Michigan Public Acts of 1895, as amended), be amended to read as follows: to-wit:

Sec. 22. Should any greater amount be required in any year for necessary corporate purposes, than can be raised by the council under the foregoing provisions of this chapter, such amount may be raised by tax if authorized by a two-thirds vote of the electors voting upon the question at an annual or special village election. The amount that may be voted or raised by tax in any year under the provisions of this section, shall not exceed two percentum of the assessed valuation of the real and personal property in the village, as shown by the last preceding special village election. The village may borrow money and issue its full faith and credit bonds therefore, for any purpose within the scope of its powers, if authorized by a two-thirds vote of the electors voting upon the question at an annual or special village election; provided, that no indebtedness shall be incurred by the issuance of bonds or otherwise, in a sum which, including existing indebtedness, shall exceed ten per centum of the assessed valuation of the real and personal property in the village as shown by the last preceding assessment roll of the village. Bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of special assessments shall not be included in this limitation and money on hand in a sinking fund limited to the payment of indebtedness may be treated as a reduction of such indebtedness to that extent.

**GRASS DAYS DRAW LARGE NUMBERS OF MICHIGAN FARMERS**  
Between 25,000 and 30,000 Michigan farmers saw demonstrations during June which emphasized

the need for more and better grass and legumes. Sponsored by the Michigan Cooperative Extension Service, the 12 demonstration days in different parts of the state attracted large crowds despite rainy

and unfavorable haymaking weather. Demonstrations in the use of fertilizer, proper seeding, pasture renovation, weed control, gully erosion control, contouring, and the use of modern haymaking equipment were featured. Other agencies, including the

Soil Conservation Service, assisted local committees in planning the field days. Local farmer committees worked with county agricultural agents in the many areas. Extension Service officials at Michigan State college are considering plans now to continue the Grass Day Demonstrations next year. Great interest shown by farmers in growing and utilizing higher quality forage for livestock proved the need for continued emphasis on grassland farming, MSC officials believe.
